Tennant announced Wednesday that the personnel file on Cox, which was reported missing on Tuesday, had been located. The City Manager added that the material had been misfiled under correspondence in the Police Department.

THREE INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENTS ON ICY PAVEMENTS

Icy patches of pavement were the cause of two personal injury auto accidents on highways in the Farmington area during the past week.

The first occurred early Thursday on the Grand River Cut-Off west of Drake Road. The auto began to skid on the icy paving and went out of control, ending into guard rails along the side of the road. A passenger, Mildred I. Gudenau, Detroit, was thrown from the vehicle, receiving minor bruises about the head and hip.

On Sunday afternoon, George Flick and his wife, Sara, of 24502 Hathaway, Farmington, were injured in a two-car collision on U. S. 16 near Hottel Road. Mrs. Flick suffered lacerations about the head and contusions of the elbow. Mr. Flick received lacerations about the eye.

One of the two autos went out of control after going into a skid on the icy paving and was hit by the second, unable to stop in time.

Township Water Development Assn. Begins Poster Contest In Area

The Township Water Association, headed by Dr. Joseph Gadow, chairman, has announced that a Poster Contest to stimulate interest in the determined, drive to bring Detroit City water into certain township areas, will begin December 16 and end January 8.

The Poster Contest is open to all residents of the City and Township of Farmington, with a first prize of a \$25.00 Savings Bond.

The Poster theme should be built around these problems—many of your neighbors cannot turn on a faucet and have an ample supply of good pure water run through it, because, in some cases, the State has condemned their deep well as being contaminated, others have shallow wells with never enough water in them. Still others must carry water in cans for all of their water needs—never enough for Saturday.

Many of our residents have been making weekly trips into Detroit pulling a tank behind their car to get pure Detroit water for their cooking and bathing needs—some are pumping water from flowing streams, and others make daily visits to a community well for fire hydrant. Lack of a good and sufficient quantity of water in the township area presents a serious health and fire hazard to the community.

These are some ideas that can be worked into your poster.

The Posters entered in the contest will be prominently displayed by City and Township merchants and will be received at The Enterprise office during the contest dates of December 16 through January 8. Winners will be announced on January 13.

Remember, the Poster should point out a "No Water" theme.

found that an additional ten feet of the plan was set up by the School Board to handle future decisions on construction where time is of the essence. A resolution was passed stating that the opinion of three or more Board members will now be considered sufficient in making decisions on matters of construction.

Some concern was expressed by members of the Board over the lack of information being given them regarding construction activities at the three new elementary school sites and at the high school. School architects, Eberle Smith and Associates, will be asked to prepare complete and up-to-date reports for study. These reports will be aired at a special meeting set by the Board for January 7.

Other matters discussed included a transportation survey being taken by the school and a proposal for the installation of a public address system in the new gymnasium—auditorium under construction at the high school. Authorization was granted to go ahead with plans for installing the P. A. system.

A request by George Lords on behalf of the Middlebelt P. T. A. for use of school rooms at reduced prices to continue square dancing classes was refused. It was the feeling of the Board that, as a matter of policy, all organizations should be treated equally in regard to the using of school facilities.

IODIZED SALT HELPS REDUCE CASES OF SIMPLE GOITER

The use of iodized salt has historical interest for those of us who live in Michigan. In the early twenties it was recognized that the addition of iodine to salt would result in the reduction in the number of cases of simple goiter. An intensive nutrition campaign was instituted by schools and public health groups and by the late twenties, about seventy-five per cent of Michigan families were using iodized salt—and the incidence of goiter had fallen.

In 1946, Dr. Kimball of Cleveland, Ohio, surveyed school children in Michigan lies in the so-called "Goiter Belt." The drinking water and foods grown in the goiter belt area do not contain enough iodine to meet the body's needs.
