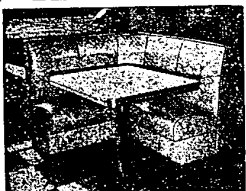

To Form County  
Citizens' League

A county-wide organizational drive is now under way in Oakland County to build a strong county and perhaps even statewide Citizens' League.

The objective of the league will be to block, fight and counteract the proposed use of state equalization funds as a basis for assessing taxes.

An appeal is being made by the Oakland County Citizens' organization to every city, town, village, and township citizens' organization to join in the drive. Interested groups are asked to name a representative to attend a county-wide conference to be held sometime in January. Names of representatives and organizations should be sent to Frank Nivelt, 1111 Cambridge, Farmington, Mich. He will give notification of the time of the meeting.

Nivelt, president of the Berkeley Citizens' League, is chairman of the drive. He is seeking widespread support in his fight with Louis N. Nims, chairman of the State Tax Commission, in his interpretation of a recent Supreme Court decision on the method of assessing taxes.

Walter O. Koch, attorney and president of the Huntington Woods Residents Association, is studying the decision for the organization. Koch is also a member of the executive board. Other members of the board are: Howard Coleman, president of the Southfield Township Citizens League; Clarence E. Wormuth, president of the Lathrup Civic League; Royce Richmond, president of the Royal Oak Farms Civic Association; John D. Michrins, president of the Madison Heights Civic Association; and Larry W. Moorhead, president of the Gardendale Improvement Association, Inc. Other members of the board will be named.

Election of officers, appointment of committees and general policies will be discussed at the first organizational meeting in January.
