**FOREIGN LANGUAGES NOW BEING TAUGHT IN GRADE SCHOOL**

Parents and children may shortly find themselves talking different languages in more ways than one.

For rapidly mounting numbers of the nation's youngsters are being treated to their first taste of a foreign language in grade school. The growing popularity of language study in colleges has led to this increasing movement to introduce foreign language study in elementary schools, according to associate professor Otto G. Graf, chairman of the University of Michigan's committee on language instruction.

Since 1947 some 700 elementary schools have introduced foreign language into their curriculum. In three of Ann Arbor's primary schools a program that was started this fall has students in the third, fourth and fifth grades learning French, Spanish and German, respectively.

Older students often enter the study of a language with a fear of its difficulty and a strong awareness of its strangeness as compared to their own. But, says Professor Graf, it has always been believed that youngsters on an elementary school level pick up a language more readily than adults because they have no such phonetic or other psychological blocks that would hinder their learning easily.

In the elementary school language classes students are not exposed to the written word. They learn the foreign language by imitation just as they first learned English.

Breaking down the barriers of monolingualism and making possible better understanding of a people through their language is the common goal of language teachers whether their students are eight or eighteen, Professor Graf concludes.

**FRANKFURTER TWO-DECKERS**
