

Metallic Finish On Fabrics Provide Added Warmth

Warmth without excess weight—that's the "buy-word" of coating fabrics sprayed with a metallic finish.

The latest use for this metallic finish is in gloves, says Esther Mencham, textiles and clothing instructor at Michigan State College. When sprayed on the glove fabric it provides sleek, adequate-fitting gloves with enough warmth.

Miss Mencham points out another recent use of metallic finishes is in drapery lining. In this way it helps insulate our homes against the heat of the sun and the cold of winter winds.

The finish is usually applied to taffetas and satins for coat and suit linings. It can also be applied to most other fabrics to be used in clothing and household materials.

The finish is identified by a silvery appearance on the back side. Although this silver may partially disappear when dry warmth is not decreased. The finish is applied to the fabrics in the form of resin. Then the material is "cured" or "baked" and the finish becomes permanent.


