Similar boards exist in many progressive governments, large and small, with outstanding records hey are not designed to eliminate responsibility but rather to facilitate investigation of facts. In most instances, such boards have only recommendation bowers with the final decision in the hands of administrative and possibly legislative officers.

Trial boards are generally composed of several appointed citizens of the community, along with rep-resentatives of the administrative and legislative branches of the government. Such an organization does not affect the individual employee's right to ap-peal under the provisions of the particular charter. It does serve to broaden the scope of investigation and allows for greater representation.

This type of program is not new, since it is practiced in business as well as government. It affords the employee an additional opportunity to have his case heard. It affords the employer additional facts and opinions upon which to base a sound decision, and it affords the public the assurance of broad and impartial investigation.
