


It's Glenn vs. Lathrup In Les Anders Finale

The 17 school Les Anders Tournament field has been narrowed to two.

It will be Westland John Glenn against Southfield Lathrup in the tourney finale Tuesday, (June 5), at 7:30 p.m. at Ford Field in Livonia.

John Glenn upended Thurston, 3-0, in the semifinals and the Cinderella team in Observerland.

Southfield Lathrup upset highly rated Redford Union, 5-3.

Redford Union and Thurston were the favored teams to contest for the championship but will not be watching the action from the sidelines with 13-12 Glenn pitted against 6-12 Lathrup.

Lathrup hurler Ron Silberstein has to be the sparkling story of the tourney. The lanky sophomore was sporting an 0-2 record before finding the mound against Franklin in the Anders opener.

Silberstein promptly downed Franklin, topped North Farmington in the quarterfinals and took care of RU in the semifinals to now stand 3-2 overall.

The opening round of the

semifinals saw two Northwest Suburban clubs in Thurston and John Glenn again matching talent with Thurston holding a 2-1 edge for '73.

Thurston Coach Emil Mackenzi went with Ray Ivey and Glenn Coach Norm Hoenes with Dave Shiffert.

Glenn struck for one in the third. Jack Peet led off with a single and Shiffert was called out stepping on home plate attempting to bunt. J. P. McBride forced Peet.

McBride stole second and moved to third on an over-throw.

McKeever followed with a bloop hit down the right field line and the Rockets were on the board.

Steve Kaufman led off with a three-bagger off Ivey. With

two outs, Jim Sampson hit a grounder to second that was booted and Kaufman scampered in with run No. 2.

The Eagles started to spread their wings in the last of the inning.

With one out, Gary Chappel drew his second walk. After two outs, Ken McLean bounced one over the fence in right center. Tom Dowdy was hit by a Shiffert pitch to fill the sacks but Shiffert got Tom Drodowski on strikes to halt Thurston's only threat.

Hoenes brought in ace hurler Dave Wesley in the sixth and seventh innings with the Rocket left-hander striking out three in the two innings to pick up the save.

Meanwhile Glenn added

another tally in the seventh. Wesley was hit by an Ivey pitch, McBride singled and with two outs, Kaufman singled in Wesley.

In the remaining semifinal clash, a 207 Redford Union squad found itself confronted with a 5-12 Lathrup crew.

RU outbit Lathrup, 7-4, but Lathrup upended RU in the column that counts with the Chargers winning it, 5-3.

Lathrup jumped on RU in the first. RU hurler Mark Hiller couldn't find the plate and hit Rob Weneck and Barry Brodsky and walked Bruce Ruhl to fill the bases with no outs.

Mike Kemper singled to score one. After Hiller struck out Jim Lechner, Randy Ross was safe on an error by RU second baseman Ron Campbell and another Charger crossed home to make it 2-0.

RU got one back in the second when Steve Friedman and Mike Kalll banged out hits off of Silberstein and coupled with two errors by Lathrup outfielders pushed across one run.

RU tied it in the fourth. Mark Yourchock led off with a single, stole second and after two outs, dashed in on a hit by Kalll.

Lathrup blew it open in the sixth. Bruce Ruhl led off with a three-bagger and after

Hiller hit Kemper with a pitch, RU Coach Bob Atkins had seen enough and brought in Tommy Miller. Miller proceeded to hit Lechner and the bases were loaded, no outs.


Randy Ross' rounded out to score Ruhl with the first run of the inning and Dave Kay followed with a grounder to RU shortstop Kalll. Then came the break that all but told the story for RU.

Kalll set himself for the throw to first and the base umpire was right in his aim. Kalll jumped to the left, the umpire moved to the left, everyone was safe, Lathrup scored again.

Miller struck out the next batsman but Silberstein was safe on an error, another run scored and Lathrup led, 5-2, going into the seventh.

Steve Friedman opened the Panther seventh with a triple and after Kalll grounded out, Lupe Bravo banged one that was ruled a ground-rule double, Friedman scoring. Tom Uych followed with a single to move Barvo to third and it appeared that RU was ready to roar.

Silberstein bore down and got pinch-hitter Tom Forma on sixes as first and Gary Palks to ground out and the Panthers had fallen with the tying run on first.
