As the official MSC engineering publication, The Spartan Engineer covers all phases of engineering, news of clubs, societies and organizations and descriptions of new developments.

A chief aim of the magazine, editor Ray Steinbuch said, is to appeal to students outside of engineering school. For this reason it is not only a technical journal, but also includes feature articles, stories of general interest, numerous pictures and even jokes, cartoons and an engineering crossword puzzle.

A typical recent issue contained full-length articles on the history of electrical engineering, progress and opportunities in chemical engineering, topology, a little known branch of mathematics, and other better features.

To meet the varied assignments the staff of the Spartan Engineer has students majoring in such fields as geology, chemistry, English, journalism and several engineering subjects. Most of the articles are written by students out faculty members and occasionally outside sources contribute.

The Spartan Engineer is published regularly four times during the school year with a special issue for the MSC Engineering Exposition each spring term.

SOUTHFIELD CHURCH DROPS AFFILIATION, NOW INDEPENDENT

The former Southfield Community Presbyterian Church, located at 21122 Indian, has recently completed action severing its relationship with the Presbyterian denomination and establishing itself as a true community church. It will henceforth be known as the Southfield Community Church.

Many different denominations are represented by the people who attend, and many others of the community, unable to locate in a church of their previous affiliation, will find they can have a vital part in this non-denominational church. Reverend H. Raymond Bayne, pastor, stated.

The community church has a strong family program. At a recent meeting of the congregation a new constitution was adopted incorporating a statement of faith and form of government. The church is governed by a group of nine elders elected by the people and responsible to them. Those elected this year include Rex Agar, Orland Thompson, Benjamin Sager, Robert Sager, Stephen Ellsworth, James Sager, Alfred Lackey, Frank Oaks, and Jasper Twinn. Mr. Francis Wallace, founder of the church and superintendent of the Bible School for thirty years, was elected a life-time elder. Rev. Bayne is serving as pastor for the eighth year.

The church has a Sunday School with an attendance of over four hundred. Free transportation is provided for all who need it through the use of two buses and a carpool. A nursery is provided during both Sunday School and morning church. There are two adult Bible classes in the Sunday School. The four youth clubs meeting during the week are based around a multiple group-graded youth choir plan which makes each a part of the club's activities and brings all the boys and girls into the church to sing as a combined choir. Reverend Howard Schoof is the music director. A recently formed young couples club, plus a women's missionary society, and a men's fellowship provide activities for the adults.

The church is located a mile and a half west of Telegraph Road and two blocks north of Eight Mile Road.
