(Continued from Page Two) and influence people," at a cost of billions to the American taxpayers, have been notably unsuccessful. A book has just been published on this subject. Its title: "Billions, Blunders and Ballyhoo" (Devine-Adair Co., New York). The author is Eugene W. Castle, who spent two years in Europe gathering material for the book.

In his book, Mr. Castle, a former newspaperman, says that in fiscal 1954 a total of 10,171 persons were on the United States Information Agency payroll performing an ineffective and largely unused service overseas. "Throughout the world," he writes, "we witness the sad spectacle of overstaffed and ineffective propaganda offices; of unscrupulous outpouring of American taxpayers' money on callow, unproductive and all too often harmful information projects; and of steadily dwindling funds for the United States in countries where the dollars are being spent."

The USA was created specifically to cultivate good will toward America. Mr. Castle examines also the Foreign Operations Administration which was given more than \$5 billion in fiscal 1955 to hand out to "our allies." Its present activities, he says, "symbolize in the self-perpetuating persistence of waste." Castle's book is a thorough-going examination of the failure of American taxpayers' billions to buy friendship and good will abroad. At stake in this costly effort is not only the taxpayers' economic welfare but the future of our international relations.
