

Sunday, May 15, to Be Soil Stewardship Day

Many churches in Michigan will observe May 15 as "Soil Stewardship Sunday."

The observance is under the sponsorship of both the Michigan and national associations of soil conservation districts. "Soil Stewardship Sunday" began in 1946 when religious leaders in southern states set aside one Sunday a year to remind their congregations of man's duty to be a good steward of the land. The idea spread rapidly.

The National Association of Soil Conservation Districts has issued reference material for the observance. It is available at soil conservation district offices.

Last year the American Red Cross issued 208,200 certificates to persons who completed home nursing training.

Six Errors Cost Falcons Third Straight Loss

The Falcon baseball team, plagued by six errors, dropped their third straight game 8-6 to the Southfield nine last Friday, May 6.

Jerry Rice, starting Falcon pitcher, struck out all three Jay batters in the Jay half of the first inning. Rice got only four strikeouts during the six innings he saw action, but he allowed only seven hits. Had he received better fielding support he may have been the victor instead of the vanquished.

Jimmy Surles started the Falcon scoring in the bottom of the first, driving a clean single through the infield. John Foxworth then smacked out a three-runner, scoring Surles ahead of him on the Jay third baseman's error.

The Jays bounced back in the top of the second to take the lead 2-1. Then the Falcons took the lead once more in the bottom of the second, 3-2.

In the top of the fifth the Jays wrested the lead from the writhing Falcons, but again the Falcons drew abreast of the Jays in the bottom of the fifth to end the inning 3-3.

After Rice walked the first batsman in the top of the seventh, Coach Piche sent in Curt Loy to do some relief pitching.

However, the Jays, aided by two errors in the sixth and seventh innings, grabbed the lead and finished the game on top, 8-6.

Clarenceville Trojans Rack Up Two More Victories, Remain Tied For First

The Clarenceville Trojans chalked up two more baseball wins last week to give them a one game lead over the first place Clarenceville High School athletic field.

A brilliant pitching performance by Sam Lebreque, the best hurling job thus far this year, gave the Trojans a 6-0 shut-out victory over Milford on May 2. He was nicked for only one hit in going the distance. In action against Holly on Thursday, May 5, the Trojans found the going much rougher but were able to stave off a determined Holly rally to beat the Braves 8-4.

The game against Milford could have been a no-hitter for Lebreque except for a slow rollout infield hit which was beaten out. The Trojans were able to collect only three hits off Milford hurlers in the contest but capitalized on lack of control to push their total of six runs across the plate.

In the Holly contest heavy hitting by Bob Grose and Bob Grose contributed greatly to the Trojans' victory. Three timely singles by Grose pushed over an equal number of runs while Grose bopped out another three hits good for three more runs.

PEP - CADILLI TO BATTLE IN REMATCH AT OLYMPIA MAY 18

Wittle PEP, one of the finest little fighting men of all time, will renew his blazing feud with Gil Cadilli, fast-moving Los Angeles featherweight, at the Olympia Stadium Wednesday, May 18.

PEP, the former featherweight champion, has been clamoring for his rematch since he lost to Cadilli in a memorable brawl on March 30. The battle was close and viciously fought all the way. The decision touched off a furious controversy. PEP's partisans insisted loudly that he had been robbed, but the decision stood.

Cadilli, managed by Red Flaherty, is a popular West Coast scrapper who has his chance to establish himself solidly among the featherweight title hopefuls if he repeat his earlier victory over PEP.

PEP has a driving incentive for wanting to even the score with Cadilli. "When the Los Angeles youngster's hand was raised after 19 brutal rounds, it marked only the second time in the amazing total of 196 professional scraps that PEP had been outpointed. His only other loss on points came way back in March, 1953, when former lightweight champion Sammy Angott took a 10-round decision over him.

Angott's win snapped a string of 12 straight victories for PEP. After the Angott match, he didn't lose again until Sandy Saddler knocked him out from under his featherweight title in October, 1948. His record before the first title bout with Saddler showed 143 victories and a draw in 145 bouts.

Cadilli and PEP have each fought three times this year. Cadilli won his three tests, beating PEP, Paul Felix and Luis Castillo. PEP whipped Herman Garry and Charles Catone in his other starts.

URGES HOMAGE TO STATE LAND, WATER FOR MICHIGAN WEEK

Observance of Michigan Week, May 15-21, affords an excellent opportunity to pay homage to the state's land and water, says conservation director Gerald E. Eddy.

As chairman of a Michigan Week committee on appreciation of natural resources, Director Eddy urged those in charge of local observances to call special attention to the role played by land and water in the development of their communities and state.

"Michigan is great for a number of reasons and among the most important are her land and water. Few if any states can boast such variability in land forms and such variety in lakes and streams," he commented.

"In Michigan there is land for agriculture, forestry, industry and recreation. Likewise, we have water for many industrial and recreational uses. These basic resources have influenced our state's progress for three centuries and their wise use now and in the years ahead will insure continued prosperity for countless generations to come," continued the director.

Communities throughout the state would do well, during Michigan Week, to take stock of the gifts nature has bestowed upon them, and to consider those gifts in their relationship to needs of the future, the director concluded.

F.H.S. Thinclads Place In Relays

Farmington's track team placed high in the Albion Relays as they collected one second, two thirds, two fourths, a sixth, and also set another school record.

Dick Grimshaw set a new school record in the 440 as he beat his own record of 53.2 by 7 of a second. He also placed third in the race. His speed was slowed down as he tripped, breaking his stride. Farmington's Dennis Mahoney and Bob Byrne placed second and fourth, respectively, in the pole vault as Mahoney cleared 11 feet, and Byrne 10 feet. Don Nichols, of the Falcon squad, high jumped 5 feet 5 inches to place third in the meet.

The 80 relay team, consisting of Dick Grimshaw, Bob Brewbaker, Tom Kosty and Dennis Mahoney, took fourth place in the meet with a time of 1:37.5. The medley relay team of John Oliver, Tom Kosty, Bob Brewbaker and George Oldfield just missed placing in the meet as they came in sixth with a time of 2:12.

The next important meet of the track season is the regional meet at Ypsilanti Saturday, May 14.
