

LIGHTER UMBRELLA ADDS HOURS TO OUTDOOR FUN

DON'T PROTESTANTS Believe In Confession?

But Protestants don't believe in confession, do they? Bob asked a friend who was a leader in a nearby Protestant church.

"Why, of course, we do, Bob. What makes you ask that?"

"There's no confession in the Protestant church, is there?"

The Bible says, 'If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He (God) is faithful and just to forgive us our sins.' (1 John 1:8, 9)"

"But you don't have any priests. To whom do you confess?"

"No, we don't have priests. The Bible tells us that we should confess our sins one to another when we have wronged one another. But there is a big difference between confession and forgiveness. The only one who can forgive sin is the One against Whom we have sinned mailing the following:

—that is God. God the Father says the great guilt of sin which would be on every human soul. The Bible says that God showed His love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5:8)

"I believe I understand that, but how do I confess my sins?"

"It is very simple, Bob. Jesus Christ, God's Son, died for you and me, and thus He paid in full the penalty for our sins so that God could forgive us. God is everywhere and knows everything. Anywhere, anywhere, can turn to God in prayer and confess his sins. Jesus, when He was on earth, invited people to come directly to Him. He said, 'Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.' (Matthew 11:28)
