Students Save The Environment

A greenhouse made of plastic stretched over a wood frame and a windmill generator are among the projects completed by students in the "Man and Environment" class at the Oakland Ridge campus of Oakland Community College.

William McNaughton teaches the environmental biology class, where students created projects in the environment.

Students Bob Morris of Farmington and Pat O'Dowd of Detroit constructed a geodesic dome greenhouse. It is

about 15 feet in diameter and cost approximately \$85.

It retains sunlight and heat during the daytime to maintain a constant temperature and can be heated during cold nights by a windmill generator built by Dennis McCoy of West Bloomfield.

McNaughton believes that wind energy technology can be utilized to heat and light homes as well as generate power for electric cars.

Use of windmills could provide a source of energy and doesn't cause pollution, McNaughton said.

Four students transformed an old refrigerator into a smokehouse used for smoking such foods as ham, bacon and fish.

Completing the smokehouse were Don Stock of Livonia, Bill Fagerlie of Wixom and Lance Edwards of West Bloomfield.

Other students collected old tires to be used for a breakaway in front of homes along Lake St. Clair.

The projects demonstrated practical solutions to environmental problems.
