One thing I would like to see is a little more vision and foresight shown by our elected officials, Township and City officials that their duties are far from mere ceremonial. Their actions now can and will affect the lives of our children and their children.

It is my suggestion that the City and Township should purchase the tract and land bounded by the west, Nine Mile on the north and Grand River on the south. Merchants would benefit greatly and it would also ease the burden on the working man.

Furthermore, I feel that there should not be any more buildings set up on Orchard Lake or Middle Roads closer than 100 feet from the edge of the present road bed. That leaves a decision to be made and made at once as to who is to pay for the removal of houses already built facing on Orchard Lake Road in Floral Park and also houses facing close on Middle.

If plans for future subdivisions should be carefully studied and details not left to the developers to choose what they are going to do. If the laws are not adequate to satisfy our demands, then they must be made so. We must have men in office who are strong, efficient and have the welfare of all the residents at heart.
