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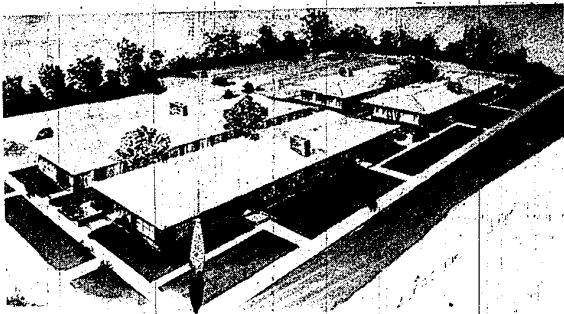

**Get Cost Estimate On Sewer Project**

Cost estimates as well as route and flexible plans for the proposed Farmington Sewer Interceptor were submitted by William Hira, engineer, at a meeting of the planning committee held Tuesday afternoon.

The cost estimates were broken down into the various units of construction. Hira stated that the total estimated cost of the entire project, including construction, engineering, inspection, legal and financial work, would be approximately \$2,355,000. This cost estimate covers the installation of a trunk line sewer from a connection with the Detroit system near Eight Mile and Shilawassee, running generally northwest along Shilawassee to Middlebelt, north on Middlebelt to Maple Road, and then west to Orchard Lake Road and north through Keego Harbor. The City of Farmington would like the units at Shilawassee and Middlebelt.

The committee anticipates that approximately half of the cost of the construction will be secured from private interests. The County Drain Commissioner is now in the process of apportioning the cost among the various governmental units involved.

Another meeting of the committee has been set for June 17 at the Oakland County Court House, at which time land developers and subdivision representatives will be given an opportunity to review the proposal.

**SCHOOL CENSUS SHOWS 7% BOOST AT CLARENCEVILLE**

Officials of the Clarenceville School District reported Monday that the annual 1955 census shows an increase of approximately 7% in the number of boys and girls between birth and 19 years as compared to last year. The greatest increase was in the group up to four years of age. The 1955 figure shows a population of 1,224 as compared to 1,133 in 1954 or approximately a 8% increase. In the group from five through 19 years the increase was approximately 4% or 2,447 in 1955 compared to 2,418 in 1954.

Officials stated that lack of new home construction in the area during the past year has held down the increase in population.

**REZONING** of the property on the northeast corner of Farmington Road and Slocum in the Warner Farms Subdivision from Residential to Commercial has cleared the way for the possible construction of this proposed new professional building. The four units would be one-story ranch-type structures and would be confined to general offices, clinics, schools, pharmacies for the sale of medical supplies only, and utility offices. A parking area would be provided on the north side of the building, and there would be no inlets or outlets across Slocum Drive. The architect's sketch and plans were submitted by the Farmington Development Company, owners of the property.

**MOLEST ATTEMPTS REVEALED IN FARMINGTON CITY**

During the past two weeks four cases of attempted molesting have been reported by young girls or their parents to City Police. Joseph McVernon, police chief, disclosed Tuesday.

The attempts to molest have been made in the vicinity of the City Park and athletic field. In at least two of the cases the assailants were reported to have been traveling in an old gray auto, believed to be a Plymouth.

(Continued from Page 1A) receive 3% of the par value of the bonds. It is understood that if this is done, the \$2,500 would be applied to the project. The Board offer covered only the \$2,500 for the survey.

FOLLOWING the reading of the letter, Mrs. Philip Nowberg, of the Water Committee, suggested that a joint meeting be held between the Board and the Committee to discuss the details of the proposal. It was also suggested that the engineer and financial consultants be present.

Separate contacts with the various firms were made by Ernest Blanchard, Township Supervisor, and officials of the Water Committee. Announcement that representatives of the engineering firm and the financial consultants would be present at the June 14 meeting came from the Committee.

citizen stated that they had checked the situation and that the grade level appeared to be too high. They stated that because of the abrupt drop now existing that a heavy rain could fill the temporary drainage ditch along the property line, causing a flooded condition.

The Building Inspector was instructed to issue no further certificates of occupancy on lots adjacent to the property facing onto Shilawassee until substantial completion of grading in accordance with the terms of the agreement and the grading plan for De-Aireville Subdivision.

Samuel Kosmenschky, secretary of the Friends of the Library, appeared before the Council to request action on the recommendations of the special committee regarding the construction of a new city-township library. He suggested that a joint meeting between the City Council, Township Board and the Friends of the Library be called to discuss the proposal. A tentative meeting was set for June 16 and Councilman James Casmanuch was instructed to contact the Township Board to complete the arrangements.

A proposal from the State Highway Department was read regarding the purchase of approximately 200 acres of city-owned land south of the Cut-Off for right-of-way in connection with the improvement of the road. The Highway Department offered to buy the land at a cost of \$14,500. The City Manager was instructed to contact the Highway Department and request \$17,500 for the property.

James Robert Lindbert requested that prompt action be taken to proceed with the enlargement of the city water system. James Tennant, City Manager, reported that arrangements have already been received for the pumping facilities and controls and the bids on the water main installation should be available by the June 20 meeting.

ship offices, church and school. A second amendment involves the proposed rezoning from Residential I to Commercial of a strip of land 125 feet in depth and lying adjacent to and immediately east of Orchard Lake Road between Fort Street and Ravine Avenue. This area is located just south of Fourteen Mile Road.

Another proposal to be discussed concerns the proposed rezoning from Commercial to Residential III of the Kristport property 330 feet west of Orchard Lake Road and immediately south of Thirteen Mile Road. The entire area would be rezoned as Residential III with the exception of a 300 foot by 300 foot piece on Thirteen Mile Road just west of Orchard Lake Road.

The final proposal involves the rezoning of the entire Park Hill Subdivision, west of Orchard Lake Road and north of Twelve Mile Road, from Residential I to Residential III.
