The Time Has Come : . .

when action should again be taken to enlarge the present two-man Township Police Department. The ever-increasing population demands greater protec-tion and improved law enforcement.

Prompt action should be taken now for a number of important reasons. The Department, for the first time, has an office which is located in the Town Hall. It has two radio equipped cars for use in patrolling and emergency calls. An appropriation has been allocated in the 1955-56 budget for the hiring of additional personnel. The work of the Department has increased to such an extent adequately dol'the job.

adequately do the 100.

The Township has made a major investment in its Police Department ... an investment that is worth protecting and enhancing. Office space has been set aside for the keeping of important police records. If they are to be of value they must be organized. This takes time and personnel. Money has been expended for two police cars as well as special radio equipment. If the full value of this investment is to be realized, it must be used to the maximum. This, too, requires additional personnel.

Most important of all, the Township population has increased tremendously since the present police force was established. This fact was acknowledged when the people approved the budget allocation for Police Department expansion in April of this year. The increased amount of traffic in the Township demands improved enforcement. The boost in the number of trouble calls requires greater attention and service. These objectives can not be accomplished—with the limited force now available.

The protection of life and property is a public responsibility which must be kept in tune with the needs of the community. The time has come to get

The latest census and projected enrollment figures as well as the current tax load bears out the seriousness of the situation. Sincere efforts are being made by the School Board and the administration to keep up with the growing demand for education facilities throughout the community. Obviously, they can not do the whole jeb. They can plan, they can present the facts, and they can develop a prospective program, but the rest is up to the community itself.

This doesn't mean just the public, for in most instances they have been more than cooperative. The voters have, almost without exception, approved and endorsed the proposals presented to them by the Board. They have assumed the responsibility for repeated building programs designed to meet the needs of the District. This means the community, including all phases and elements of its make-up.

We must analyze all of the resources and advantages available and capitalize on them to the advantage of the entire community. We can not expect the individual to continue to carry all of the burden. An organized effort must be made to improve our general tax base through increased commerce and industrated tax base through increased commerce and industry and a more systematic and uniform method of ap-praising must be established.

The problem is becoming much too real to be ignored. It is with us . . . we must face it and lick it.




