



### The Recommendation . . .

of the Road Committee to allocate \$15,000 in Township

of the Road Committee to allocate \$15,000 in Township funds to the County for road repair and maintenance should be carried out at once by the Township Board. This opinion is based on a number of cold, hard facts. In the first place, the funds appropriated by the County for yepair and maintenance of roads in the Township during 1955 are exhausted. Unless supplementary funds are provided, work will have to cease. The only other alternative would be to borrow against next year's appropriation, which would just increase the problem.

increase the problem. If the \$15,000 would be taken from the \$50,000 al-located in the 1955-56 Township budget for road repair. In view of the fact that the money has been repair. In view of the fact that the money has been appropriated, the recommendation is simply a prac-tical application of the desires of the people. Because of statutory limitations, the Township can not, by itself, build and maintain roads. It must work through and cooperate with the County. Therefore, under the present organization, the allocation of supplementary funds to the County is the only way in which the Township can contribute to the local road descent program:

program: We believe that through the cooperation of the Township Board and the newly appointed Road Com-mittee. a planned program of road rebuilding can be established and carried out. It will require a lot of time and hard work, but it can be done. Good roads are an essential part of the progress of the commun-ity and the welfare of the people. We have a long way to go before all of the objectives can be reached. But, this is a start, and a good one . . . we hope it becomes a reality!

# The Lack Of Water . . .

continues to be a major topic of concern throughout the Farmington City and Township area. Last week the City established tighter stand-by controls on the use of outside water in case of emergency. At the same time, the Farmington School Board was advised that the water supply at the new Gill Road School yeas indexnate. was inadequate.

was inadequate. Although it is little consolation, Farmington is not the only community plagued with water problems. In fact, most of the cities and township in the metro-politan area have been forced to adopt restrictions on the use of water. This points up the growing needs for prompt action in the development of an area-wide water program to meet the future needs of the south-eastorn section of the state. Considerable study and discussion has already been held in connection with such a program. It is important that it be continued and expanded as rapidly as possible. In the meantime, every effort must be made by

and expanded as rapidly as possible. In the meantime, every effort must be made by all units of local government to secure an adequate supply of water to meet existing needs and to plan for future development. The planning phase is espe-cially important. Both the City and Township are now in the process of expanding their water pro-grams. Some prior planning might have done much to ease the present situation, and it certainly can help in the immediate future. Recardless of what hannens on an area these

In the immediate future. Regardless of what happens on an area basis, the water problem will be ours to solve for some time to come. It is important that we concentrate on the immediate needs and get them taken care of as quickly as possible. It is also important that we look to the future in the development of both a local and an area-wide program which will provide ample facilities for our growing community.
