A Footnote . . .

on the latest fatal accident report at the intersection of Twelve Mile Road and Orchard Lake Road read, "This scene urgently needs a traffic light in operation 24 hours a day!" The note was added by the Farmington Township Polico Department, who have had the unhappy task of covering more accidents at this intersection than they care to think about.

this intersection than they care to think about.

Not only should a regulation traffic light be erected at the corner, but efforts should be made to straighten out the jog and reduce the hill on Orchard Lake Road just north of the intersection. The road repair and alteration will, of course, require some time, but it should be expedited with the utmost haste. In the meantime, the erection of a necessary traffic light would greatly reduce the present alarming accident rate at the intersection.

It is frequently argued that a regulation traffic light will not, in itself, eliminate auto accidents. This is undoubtedly true, but at the same time they can and do reduce the possibility of accidents. This has been proven right here in the Farmington area. The erection of traffic lights at Farmington Road and the Cut-Off, Grand River and Middlebelt, and Nine Mile and Middlebelt have turned extremely dangerous intersections into comparatively safe ones. We have the reduced number of accident reports to prove it.

We believe that this footnote deserves commun-wide attention. We also believe that it deserves ity-wide attention. We also believe that it deserves prompt action. The Township Board should, in our opinion, petition the Oakland County Road Commission for the immediate erection of a traffic light at the intersection and the subsequent improvement of the approaches on Orchard Lake Road.

This should be done now, before more people are killed or injured. Let's hope that this footnote will become a keynote in the continuing campaign of

The progress was accomplished at a joint session of the City Council and Township Board held last Wednesday evening in the Town Hall. In addition to the City and Township officials, members of the Friends of the Library organization and the Library Board participated in the discussion. Both the Council and the Township Board voiced their approval of the general plan and expressed a willingness to proceed with the necessary organizational steps in establishing new library facilities.

There were naturally some differences of opinion as to the methods of procedure, especially in the field

as to the methods of procedure, especially in the field of financing, but there seemed to be little difference in the objective. As a result of the meeting, initial steps have been taken toward the organization of a library district for Farmington.

If the same spirit of willingness and cooperation, as was displayed at the joint meeting, continues and spreads, Farmington will have a library it can be justly proud of . . . and not too far in the distant future, either!
