

ARCHERY DEER SEASON TO RUN FROM OCT. 1 - NOV. 5

Michigan archers will be able to hunt deer with bow and arrow statewide from October 1 to November 5 this year, as usual. Firearm hunters will also have their usual November 15 - 30 season.

And in Allegan County, the archery season will run October 1 to December 15 and the special 1500-permit firearm season will be held December 1 to 11.

The Conservation Commission authorized the seasons at a recent meeting at Higgins Lake.

Exceptions and changes from last year are:

- 1) Archers can take "any deer" statewide except in Menominee, Emmet, Chippewa, Bay and Huron Counties and the mainland of Chippewa County, where only a legal buck may be taken.
- 2) There will be no special any deer season in the northern lower peninsula.
- 3) The area in the Allegan County special firearm season is somewhat larger to include more deer damage fruit and farm land.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 10 WILL BE VETERAN'S DAY AT STATE FAIR

The Michigan State Fair has designated Veterans' Day to be Saturday, September 10, when the State's veterans will cooperate in the largest program of events and ceremonies ever offered at the State Fair.

All veterans will be admitted free of charge by identifying themselves or wearing their service caps, according to State Fair General Manager Donald L. Swanson.

The program features will include: the American Legion Zouaves, the internationally famous precision drill team from Jackson, Michigan; an exhibition by the WAVES drill team from the Great Lakes Naval Training Station; a demonstration by outstanding drum and bugle corps; and a great Veterans Day parade.

Mental services will be held at 5 p.m. at the Veterans' Monument on the fairgrounds. The ceremony at the monument will be followed by a formal retreat ceremony.

Featured attractions for the evening program will be band concerts by the Red Arrow Legion Band, Post 361, and the Charles Young Legion Band, Post 77.

As a part of its activities at this year's Fair, the Allied Veterans Council of Wayne County will operate a booth at which handicraft items made by hospitalized and disabled veterans will be on sale.
