

MOTORISTS DO NOT KNOW REAL CAUSES OF AUTO CRASHES, SAYS INSURANCE FIRM

More than half of all American motorists appear to be ignorant of the real causes of automobile accidents which are responsible each year for more than 37,000 deaths and 1,850,000 injuries on the highways of this country.

This conclusion is based on a survey of motorists' opinions recently taken by the Institute for Safety Living of the American Mutual Liability Insurance Company.

A typical group of more than 500 motorists were asked by representatives of the Institute to answer this question: "What, in your opinion, is the biggest single cause of highway accidents?"

Of this group, 264 drivers or more than 53 per cent showed a common tendency to alibi driving mistakes or justify violations of safe driving principles and practices. Instead of facing up to the basic causes of accidents which law enforcement and safety agencies continually emphasize, better than half of the drivers questioned blamed highway mishaps on "road hogs," "impatient," "teen-agers," "risky drivers," "modern cars," "women drivers," "wrong laws," and similar evasions. In short,

says the Institute, these drivers are ready to blame their misdeeds on the highway or other drivers and factors rather than on themselves.

Only 236, less than 47 per cent, gave those immediate and direct causes which have been established on statistical evidence by safety authorities as fundamental causes of highway destruction.

Chief among these are speeding too fast for conditions and uncontrolled speed, passing in the wrong place and in the wrong way, pulling in and out of traffic, mechanical failure of cars, failure to comply with the rules of the road and failure to heed traffic signs and signals installed to aid traffic.

Latest nationwide figures of the National Safety Council show that out of every 100 drivers involved in fatal accidents, some 55 highway safety rule was violated by 72 of them. Of this number, 31 accidents resulted from excessive speed.

Football practice will get under way at Clarenceville High School, as at other high schools throughout the state, on Monday, August 29.

The Trojans will open their season against Farmington on the Falcons' home grounds on September 16 at 3:30 p.m.
