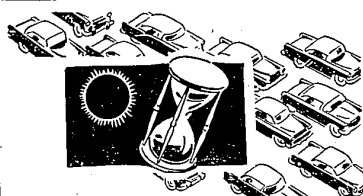

**Notice of Registration
of the Qualified Electors of School

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS:
PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Board of Education of School District No. 5 Fractional, of the Townships of Farmington, Livonia and Redford has caused a Special Election to be held in said school district on October 3, 1955.

TAKE NOTICE THEREFORE, that any qualified elector of said school district who is not already registered upon the books of the aforesaid school district may register at the following places on the days and hours indicated:

DAYS AND HOURS: Each day during office hours until September 23, 1955, at five (5) p.m. Eastern Standard Time.

LAST DAY OF REGISTRATION: September 23, 1955, but not after five (5) p.m. Eastern Standard Time.

For this special school election, persons registering must meet the following requirements:

1. Must be a citizen of the United States.
2. Must be over twenty-one years of age.
3. Resident of the State of Michigan for 6 months and of the School District for 30 days prior to any special or regular elections.

TAKE NOTICE that those qualified electors who have not heretofore registered with the Clerk of the City of Livonia, the Clerk of Redford Township, or the Clerk of Farmington Township, must do so to be eligible to vote in the forthcoming election. Those qualified who are now duly registered to vote in the area in which they reside within this school district need not re-register.

TAKE NOTICE that at said election there will be submitted a proposition to authorize an increase in millage in the amount of five (5) mills per year for five (5) years for the purpose of meeting the costs of current operations.

To Meet September 21

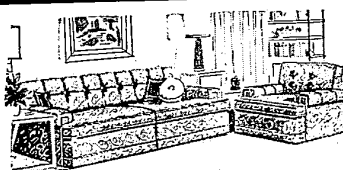
