Southfield Church  
Begins Huge New  
Building Program

With an average Sunday School attendance last spring of 544, the Southfield Community Church, 21222 Indian Street, was faced with a space problem. Accepting the challenge of being in the heart of four rapidly growing communities—Southfield, Bedford, Livonia and Farmington—a building program has been started. A financial campaign was launched Sunday, September 11, with a dedication service for workers at the morning worship hour. Victory Sunday will be September 25 as the total of pledges is reported.

Ministering "to the heart" in the heart of these four communities, the Southfield Church has experienced a growth in all of its services in all departments. The average attendance for 52 Sundays increased from 154 in 1948 to 384 in 1954 and is moving considerably ahead of that in 1955. With five youth clubs meeting weekly, facilities are also taxed to provide for them. Some 100 youths are enrolled in the combined youth choirs which sing each Sunday morning in the worship service.

The building in which they now meet was originally constructed with voluntary labor by a community building in 1925 and was taken over by the church in the 1930's and has served well. The additions planned include a 60' x 60' building with a basement housing two Sunday School departments of 175 pupils each with fifteen individual classrooms in each department. Partitions will be quickly removable, making the two large rooms available for group activities. This will cost \$62,000. The upper floor will be a new auditorium for worship. With plain lines, but attractive and comfortable, it will seat over 500 and will cost \$53,000. In front of the present building will be a three-floor 40' x 50' addition to provide for large individual classes and office space. This will cost \$38,000, making the total project \$153,000.

The church is already using facilities of the John Grace School next door for both week activities and Sunday School. Chairman of the Building Committee is Robert Sager. Other members include Rex Agar, Ben Sager and Orland Thompson. The Building Finance Committee is headed by James Sager and includes Stephen Ellsworth, Alfred Lackey, Frank Oaks, Jasper Twin and Francis Wallace. Raymond Bayne is the pastor.

Mr. William Green, formerly of Sunnydale Avenue, is recuperating in Breunel General Hospital from a minor operation.

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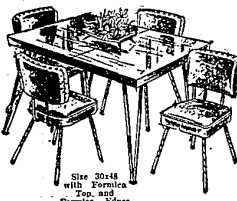
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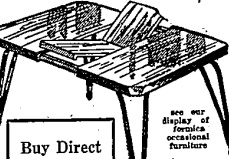
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
