COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

At an adjourned meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington, Michigan, held in the city hall in the city of the 26th day of September, 1955, at 8:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time.

Present: Calkins, Cavanaugh, Bates, Lindbergh. Absent: Chapman. The City Clerk presented to the Council an affidavit showing that the minutes of the Council meeting held on September 19, 1955, relating to the introduction of Ordinance No. C-46-55 and the placing of the same upon the table were published in the Farmington Enterprise on September 22, 1955. By unanimous consent said affidavit was ordered filed with the City Clerk.

It was moved by Calkins and seconded by Bates that Ordinance No. C-46-55 be taken from the table and be placed upon the order of its first passage. Yeas: Calkins, Bates, Lindbergh, Cavanaugh. Nays: None. It was moved by Cavanaugh and seconded by Calkins that Ordinance No. C-46-55 be taken from the table and be placed upon the order of its first passage. Yeas: Calkins, Bates, Lindbergh, Cavanaugh. Nays: None. The Mayor declared the ordinance adopted.

The following is Ordinance No. C-46-55 as amended: **ORDINANCE C-46-55** An Ordinance to Amend Sections 2 and 4 of Ordinance No. C-15-33 Entitled: An Ordinance to Provide for Improving, Enlarging and Extending the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System of the City of Farmington, Michigan; to Provide for the Issuance and Sale of Revenue Bonds to Defray the Cost thereof; to Provide for the Retirement and Security of Said Bonds; and to Provide for Other Matters Relative to said System and Said Bonds.

Section 1. Sections 3 and 4 of Ordinance No. C-15-33 are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 3. The Council hereby determines it to be advisable and necessary to improve, enlarge and extend the water supply and sewer disposal system of the city by requiring the following:

1. Water mains located as follows:

(a) From the proposed pump house (located approximately 1000 feet west of Farmington Road and 200 feet south of the Grand River Cut-Off) north in city property to said Cut-Off; thence northwest in the Grand River Cut-Off north in Gill Road and east in Grand River Avenue to Pickett Avenue — 6'.

(b) In Oakland Avenue from Gill Road to Pickett Avenue — 430'.

(c) In Farmington Road from Cloverdale to a point 800' north — 900' of 8" water main.

(d) In Shawanawee Road from existing pump house to Power Avenue — 600' of 8" water main.

(e) In Valley View Avenue from end of existing main to Valley View Circle — 270' of 6" water main.

2. Water supply wells; one pump house; one combined pump and master electrical control signal transmission house; one Chronoflow Telemetering Electric Pump and Pressure Control System; two 600 gal. per minute deep well turbine pumps; and appurtenances, with reconditioning and reinstallation of existing Pomona deep well turbine pump.

3. Combined Storm and Sanitary

Section 2. That the bond form contained in Subsection 2 of said Ordinance No. C-46-55 is hereby amended by substituting in the second paragraph for the words "Ordinance No. C-46-55" the following: "Ordinance No. C-46-55 as amended by Ordinance No. C-46-55, duly adopted by the Council of said city on the 5th day of July, 1955, and the 26th day of September, 1955, respectively."

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be recorded in the minutes of the meeting of the Council at which it was adopted, as soon as practicable after its passage, which record shall be authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk of said City, and shall be published once in the Farmington Enterprise, a newspaper of general circulation within the said City. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

Section 4. All ordinances and resolutions and parts thereof, insofar as the same may be in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

Sewers located as follows:

(a) In the east side of Farmington, thence from Cloverdale to Silecum — 520' of 15" and 512' of 12" sewer.

(b) Prospect Avenue from the south line of Bel-Aire Hills Subdivision to Valley View Avenue, thence northwest in easement approximately 800 feet to Out Lot 2, thence northwest to the North Branch of River, thence north and parallel to Shawanawee Road from Prospect Avenue to a point 300 feet distant.

(c) In easement approximately 250 feet north of and parallel to Shawanawee Road from Prospect Avenue to a point 300 feet distant.

(d) In Shawanawee Road from Prospect and Power — 600' of 12" sewer.

4. Sanitary Sewers located as follows:

(a) From the southerly line of Out Lot B of Bel-Aire Hills Subdivision in easements to the River House in Grand River Avenue — 10' of 8" and 1753' of 10" sewer.

(b) From easement north of Grand River Avenue at the east line of Lot 1, Brookside Subdivision, thence northeast in easement 330' — 330' of 10" sewer.

(c) From easement north of Grand River Avenue at a point 233' east of the east line of Lakeway Avenue, thence in easement parallel to Lakeway Avenue 620' — 620' of 10" sewer.

(d) From Farmington Road opposite Cloverdale, thence west and southwest in easement to east line of Alta Lane Subdivision — 330' of 10" sewer.

Section 4. (Continued from Page 1A) School Board to attend the next meeting for the purpose of discussing a request for increased safety protection in school zones. The School Board in a letter, has requested the Township to consider the restricting of speed within school zones, of patrolling streets in the vicinity of schools, and to deputize adult crossing guards at hazardous intersections during the opening and closing hours of school.

A motion was approved by the Board declaring its intent to assume a proportionate share of the cost of the proposed sewer interceptor in the amount of \$1,018,543.46 and when the interceptor is approved and bonds are sold, the Board has advanced not less than \$250 per lot.

A resolution submitted by Mrs. Elise Avery, Trustee, and approved by the Planning Commission, regarding procedures to be followed in the acceptance of future subdivision plats, was laid on the table for further study. Following a detailed discussion of the proposal, A. G. Leonard, Township Attorney, agreed to assist the Board and the Planning Commission in the redrafting of the resolution. A second resolution, submitted by Mrs. Avery, regarding the compensation of Trustees at meetings other than regular sessions, was also tabled. Mrs. Avery stated that a number of special meetings have been held at which no compensation was allowed. She stated that the resolution was designed to clarify the situation.

Considerable debate developed between Blanchard and Mrs. Avery following the presentation of a resolution asking that the Supervisor maintain a file of correspondence in the Township office and that it be made available to the officers and trustees. Blanchard stated that such a file does exist and that it is available on request or when he is in the office. Mrs. Avery stated that she has experienced difficulty in securing this material.

The Board approved a motion that any re-inspection of buildings by the building inspector be charged to the owner at a fee not to exceed \$5.00, with the exact charge to be left to the discretion of the inspector.
