Farmington Band To Play At U-M On October 15

The Farmington High School band, directed by Mr. Robert Zimmerman, will be among 182 high schools participating in the world's largest massed band day at the University of Michigan October 15 during the Michigan-Northwestern football game.

The estimated 11,500 band members taking part, including those of the sparkling Michigan marching band, will entirely fill the Michigan stadium and will stretch up into the end zone seats during the halftime show.

This seventh annual event will be more than six times larger than the original gathering held in 1949. Then there were only 29 bands and 1,850 participants.

Last year 110 bands were represented, a record number.

Several other bands from high schools in Oakland County will also participate.

Michigan ranks first in the growth of tart cherries. More than half of the entire U. S. cherry crop is grown in the state.

Any donations will be gratefully received.

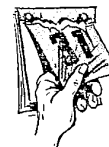

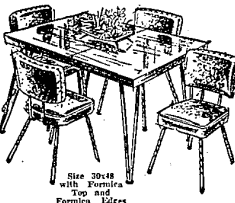

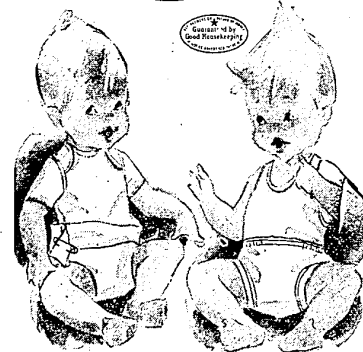
