## Avoid Buying New Home On Impulse.

A new home is probably the most important purchase you will ever make. Chances are it will cost more than anything else you ever buy and will influence your lifestyle for years to come.

But buying the right home isn't easy. Unless you are an expert, it can be difficult to evaluate construction and design - and even more difficult to judge the qualities of the community and the location of the house you are looking at.

The best advice is to avoid buying on impulse. Even if you are sure you have found your dream home, go back and check the less obvious details that affect durability and liveability of your new home.

buying dollar, the American Wood Council suggests you first study the overall town or neighborhood, then the immediate community before zeroing in on the house itself.

FIND OUT, AS MUCH as you can about the area in which you wish to live. A tour of the neighborhood or development shows whether other houses in the area are attractive and well kept. Have trees and open spaces been preserved to create a good environment? Does local zoning or community master plan assure that this environment will be maintained?

Househunters should also consider the recreational facilities provided: -Are-there-safe-pedestrianpaths for children to walk to school bicycle on. Narrow, curving streets are often more attractive as well as safer in that traffic moves

It is also important to find out what the local tax rate is since property or real estate taxes are a large portion of a homeowner's expense. Whether you have school-age children or not, the quality of the school system is an important consideration since a large share of the local tax dollar goes for schools. To help you evaluate the school system ask the local school superintendent about the per capita pupil expenditure, teacher/pupil ratio and teacher salary

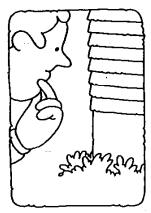
You will also want to find out how long it will take you to get to work and what transportation facilities exist. The best way to answer this question is a trial run during rush hours. Other items to check into are shopping facilities and community services. The local chamber of commerce can be a valuable source of information.

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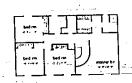
