STATE'S GROWING ELK HERD CREATES FEEDING PROBLEM

Michigan's elk herd, estimated at more than 600, threatens to create a problem in game management, says the Conservation Department. The herd, which started with the release of seven elk in the Pigeon River state forest near Vandershit in 1918. has grown rapidly in the last few years. Conservation workers stated that they signted more than 200 in less than an hour recently.

Private landowners in the area have complained that elk are causing damage to pine; ched and other trees with low branches. Game specialists think the maulien of the trees may be an effort by the elk to polish their antiers.

In some cases, elk actually eat twigs although they are primarily grass-eating animals. Damage to trees with low-hanging branches also reduces the available supply of deer food.


