patriotic and other service clubs; and, above all, by the school people of the nation. President Eisenhower has stated that our resistance to Communism cannot be strong unless our people understand our freedom structure in America. But there hasn't been enough echoing of this important statement among other responsible leaders in our political, economic and educational institutions.

Nearly \$90 Million In Disaster Relief Funds Allocated In Three Years

The Federal Civil Defense Administration recently reported on three years of disaster relief operations during which nearly \$90 million in Federal relief funds have been allocated to 38 states, Alaska, and Hawaii.

In January, 1953, by executive order, FCDA was assigned the responsibility of coordinating the activities of all Federal agencies in natural disaster relief, in addition to its function of organizing the nation's non-military defense against enemy attack.

Since that time, the agency received more than 90 disaster areas involving 66 floods, 10 hurricanes, nine tornadoes, multiple droughts, an earthquake, a forest fire, and a volcano eruption, in Hawaii.

The largest allotment of funds for a single disaster — nearly \$30 million — went to the Northeastern States by the record floods which followed Hurricane Diane in the fall of 1955.

A good part of the total allocations — \$34 million — was for relief of multiple drought districts in 22 states and Hawaii, during the three-year period.

The disaster funds are voted by Congress on a continuing basis and made available to the Executive Office of the President to be used at his discretion. Money is allotted from the funds on FCDA's recommendations.

Authority for the relief work is the Federal Disaster Act (Public Law 878) which says it is the intention of Congress "to provide a continuing and orderly means of assistance" for any areas in which the President shall declare a major disaster.

Under the act, the relief system quickly marshals help and resources from every department of the Federal government, if necessary. Before this, Federal officials kept a careful eye on natural conditions that could become disasters.

The Northeast floods resulting from Hurricane Diane are a good example of the system in action. When 12 inches of rain fell in upper watershed areas of six states, government experts already on the scene knew a disaster was in the making.

On August 10, before the down-pour ended, they were reporting to the White House. Governors in the area made direct applications to the President for aid, certifying that damage had outrun their states' resources. FCDA Administrator Val Peterson, the President's chief of staff for disaster relief, recommended immediate aid. Within a few hours, the
