Farmington High Teenagers Selected For U. Of M. Group Dynamics Study

Farmington has been chosen by the University of Michigan as one of the sites for an experiment in group dynamics.

Together with the Department of Christian Education of the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Churches, the Youth Division of the Research Center of Group Dynamics of the University of Michigan is experimenting with 20 different groups throughout the state and one in Washington, D.C. These are eighteen churches in Michigan sponsoring twenty groups.

Some of the groups in Michigan are located in Dearborn, Cranbrook, Flint, Birmingham, Grosse Pointe, Grosse Ile, Clarenceville, and Albion.

The purpose of the group is to hold informal meetings at which teenagers can talk over their problems, such as cheating, dating, studying, smoking and drinking.

The scholarship pays \$200 per school year.

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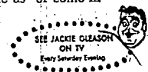
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
