

LEGAL NOTICE

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Regular meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington was held January 9, 1955. Meeting was called to order at 8:25 p.m. by Mayor Lindbert. Roll Call: Lindbert, Chapman, Cavanaugh, Calkins, Bates. All present.

Minutes of adjourned regular meeting held December 22, 1954, and regular meeting held December 19, 1955, were read and approved. Communications were read and placed on file.

Motion made by Calkins and supported by Bates that no action be taken on the petition of the Woodcroft Civic Association, Incorporated, relating to Standby water services for use in case of fire in Woodcroft Subdivision. Motion carried, all yeas.

Paul Fure, City Attorney, authorized to contact Pate and Hill, Engineers, regarding recommendation of changes in Water and Sewer Engineering Contracts submitted to Council for approval.

Motion made by Cavanaugh and seconded by Calkins that ORDINANCE NO. C-3848, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE NO. C-1839 KNOWN AS ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON BY ENLARGING DISTRICT OF COMMERCIAL DISTRICT be adopted and enacted as follows:

A petition having been filed with the City of Farmington to rezone the premises hereinafter described as a Commercial Zone, and said petition having been referred to the Planning Commission of the City of Farmington and its recommendation received, and

The Council having set a certain time and place for a public hearing on said petition, and having given notice and caused publication to be made of said hearings as required by law and by Ordinance of the City of Farmington, and

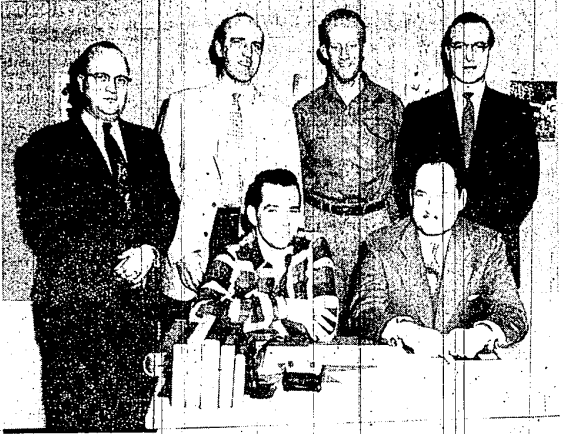
Public hearings having been had at which all interested parties and at which all present were given opportunity to be heard, both for and against the granting of said petition.

NOW THEREFORE THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS: That Ordinance No. C-1839 known as the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Farmington and the same is hereby amended as follows:

Premises now known as Our Lady of Sorrows Elementary School described as: The North side of Grand River Avenue, West of and abutting Monney Avenue; having an East line of approximately 1202.07 feet along Monney Avenue; a West line of approximately 1161.73 feet and a frontage on Grand River Avenue of 355.15 feet, be rezoned as follows:

1. All that part of said premises lying Southerly of the following line: From a point in the West line of said premises 600 feet North of the present North line of Grand River Avenue and a line extending perpendicular to said West line to the East side of said premises be rezoned as Commercial Property.

2. That the remaining Northerly portion of said premises be zoned and used for off-street parking purposes.
