Well Baby Clinic To Be Offered Twice Monthly

Plans have been completed to increase the services of the Farmington Well Baby Clinic from once to twice a month, the second and fourth Wednesday mornings, beginning in February.

Figures released by Miss Halvorsen of the Oakland County Health Department for the period January 1, 1955 to January 1, 1956, reveal that 22 new infants were examined for the first time and 27 infants returned for further examinations. It was also revealed that 80 pre-school children were examined for the first time and 77 returned for further examination; and 7 were examined for entrance to school. A total of 58 infants and pre-school children completed the series of inoculations.

The clinic was established by the Farmington Business and Professional Women's Club under the supervision of the Oakland County Health Department. It is designed to provide pre-school children and infants with physical examinations and immunizations. All illnesses discovered are referred to the patient's family physician for treatment. Local physicians are in attendance at each meeting. Registered nurses and aides are also present to record the case histories and prepare the children for examination.

Due to the increased hours, more nurses and aides are needed. Any one wishing to assist in the clinic is asked to contact Mrs. Ellen Kulback, chairman, at GR. 4-1774. Drivers are also needed to transport the children and their mothers to and from the clinic. Persons who are available even part time are asked to call Mrs. Kulback.
