school. The proposed tax levy and subsequent bond issue will have to be submitted to the voters for approval. Officials emphasized that the \$750,000 figure is only preliminary and is subject to change at the advice of the attorneys.

An special meeting of the Board will be held Thursday evening for the purpose of reviewing general plans in connection with the new high school building. Walter Ankus has been requested to be present at the meeting. Bids on the purchase and installation of gas stoves for the Edgewood School kitchen will also be discussed at the meeting.

Authorization was granted by the Board for the employment of a special correctionist and a visiting teacher as part of the Countywide Special Education Program. The teachers are to be hired by the Clarenceville Board, but their compensation will be reimbursed by the District from the County.
