## Northern Michigan Rabbit Season Closes March 31

Rabbit hunting season closed January 31 in the southern half of the lower peninsula, but hunters can enjoy another month of the sport in northern portions of the state.

Snowshoe hares and rabbits are legal game through March 1 in the northern lower peninsula and all of the upper peninsula.

With the shorter hunting season in southern areas, the number of cottontails bagged is far below annual rabbit production. Studies by Conservation Department and Michigan State University researchers show that hunters could take almost double the annual rabbit kill in a single season without reducing the next year's production.

Cottontails can claim the title of Michigan's most popular small game animal. During the 1954-55 season, hunters bagged about 1,000,000 rabbits and another 205,000 hares.

Boys can enjoy scouting over a longer span, from age eight to sixteen.
