CITY TO RECEIVE \$3,796 FROM ROAD FUND

The City of Farmington will receive a total of \$3,796.38 as its portion of the fourth quarter receipts from the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund and the increased Gas and Weight Tax. Charles M. Ziegler, State Highway Commissioner, announced this week.

The city's portion of the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund is \$3,390.76 while the increased Gas and Weight Tax receipts amount to \$405.62. The Motor Vehicle Fund includes all state gasoline, weight and diesel fuel taxes and a small amount of miscellaneous fees. The increased gas and weight tax monies include funds received through the 11 cent per gallon jump in gasoline taxes as well as additional weight taxes.
