Wins Homemaker Award At C. H. S.

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow in Clarenceville High School is Irene Stamper.

She received the highest score in a written examination which tested the homemaking knowledge and attitudes of senior girls who will be entering in competition to name this state's candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and will also be considered for the runner up award in the state. She will receive a golden award pin designed by Tri-fa and the school will receive a "Betty Crocker Good and Easy Cook Book."

The national winner in the search conducted among 256,334 young women in 10,222 of the nation's public, private and parochial high schools, will be named April 12 at the American Table banquet in Philadelphia.

General Mills is the sponsor of the program designed to assist schools in building in young women a deeper appreciation and understanding of the American home and to emphasize through a sound scholarship award program the personal qualities and sense of values necessary to successful homemaking. More than \$100,000 in scholarships will be awarded.

EXPERT REVEALS DATA ON FISH SPAWNING HABITS

Under that frosty blanket of ice covering the lakes, fish are beginning to cuddle up.

At least some varieties are preparing to spawn, and there are several scientific explanations for it, according to John E. Bardach, professor of fisheries at the University of Michigan.

"A fish's genetic make-up determines how it will react to changing light and temperature as winter turns into spring," Professor Bardach states. He adds that fisheries biologists have been able to pin down critical temperatures below which certain fish will not spawn.

"Temperature and light are translated into spawning activity in the fish by its endocrine system. The proportions of hormones the fish produces changes as he gets ready to spawn," the professor explains.

A fish like a pike will spawn at pretty near freezing temperature, and a perch will spawn at about 50 degrees, says Professor Bardach.

The Falcons quitted led through out the game until the final minutes when the Vikings pulled even. At the end of the regulation time of play the score was knotted at 60-60.

In the three-minute overtime, however, the Walled Lake five managed to squeeze ahead of the Falcons.
