Lady of Sorrows School students for two or three nights a week for an athletic program. A request for use of the gymnasium and the school cafeteria for a musical concert program was also granted by the Board without charge.

A report on the progress made by Board members in obtaining school sites indicated that negotiations are being continued with property owners for elementary school sites in the William Grace School area and near the Kendallwood Subdivision development. Attempts to negotiate for a site in the City of Farmington are also being continued, it was stated.

It was revealed by Trustee Douglas Hammill that an offer had been received for the purchase of a parcel of land in Section 16 near Quaker Valley Subdivision. The Board moved that the proposition be turned over to the school attorney to work out a favorable option or purchase agreement.

Other action by the Board included the appointment of Gerald Harrison, high school principal, to the newly-established position of assistant superintendent of secondary instruction and the granting of authorization to Superintendent Dunkel for the hiring of additional teachers. The establishment of a second assistant superintendent in the Farmington school system was recommended by Dunkel. An administrator to take over the position of high school principal has not yet been named.

CONSUMERS POWER PLANS HUGE GAS SERVICE PROJECT

Consumers' Power Company will invest more than \$14,000,000 in its Southeast Division, headquartered at Pontiac, during 1956 to expand and improve its natural gas services throughout Oakland, Macomb and western Wayne counties, according to Division Manager David H. Gerhardt.

Gerhardt announced that the company will install, in various division areas, some 140 miles of new gas mains to meet the needs of an estimated 25,000 new customers which it expects to add to its service lines during the year.

In addition, an important new 16-inch gas main will be installed from the mains of the Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line Company in the Northville gas fields to the company's Coolidge Highway gas regulator station in Royal Oak, a distance of some 28 miles. This will provide for a new source of supply of gas from Panhandle, and from the Northville fields, to the company, Gerhardt said.

Important improvements to many gas regulator stations on the service lines will result in better service and more efficient operation of the system, according to Gerhardt. Principal regulator projects will take place at stations in Macomb, south Oakland and west Wayne Counties, he said.

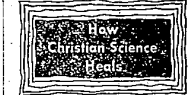
