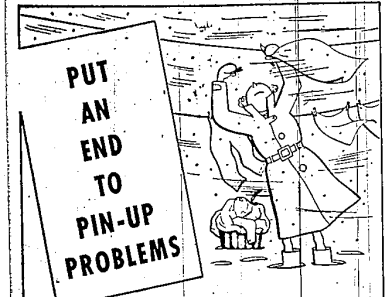

wealth-potential. Yet history shows that an over-heavy tax burden, if long continued, will sap the vigor and vitality of a nation.

As Chief Justice John Marshall said: "The power to tax involves the power to destroy."

There is a proposal in Congress, the Reed-Dirksen Amendment, which would limit the top rate of income taxes to 25 percent. A three-fourths majority vote in Congress could, however, assess higher taxes, so long as the top rate would not exceed the lowest rate by more than 15 percentage points.

The adoption of this amendment would free considerable investment capital. As a result business and industrial expansion would so broaden the tax base that before long the government treasuries would be benefited instead of injured. And everybody's burden would be lessened.

This is a sound route for America, and necessary to assure enough jobs for our rapidly increasing population.
