Chinese Girl Guest Of F.H.S. Senior Student

A new world, new customs, a new language, new acquaintances — these are some of the things which Lin Kven Lee from Hong Kong has to face.

She arrived in the United States Wednesday, February 8, by plane and is staying with Mrs. Giffin, a senior in F. H. S., and Mr. and Mrs. Robert Giffin of Northwestern.

The Giffin family became acquainted with Custer Hong Lin Kven Lee's fiancé, who has been in this country seven years, while he worked in a restaurant in Birmingham. He now owns and operates "China City," a Chinese restaurant in Pontiac.

Through this relationship, the Giffin family became interested in Lin Kven Lee and applied through the Refugee Relief Act and the Church World Service to have her come and live with them.

She is 21 years old and is an orphan with no living relatives in China. She can speak no English. The letters written between the Giffins and Lin Kven Lee had to be translated in Hong Kong.

However, now that she is living in the United States, she is learning to speak English. Mrs. Giffin is teaching her, although the other members of the family contribute greatly.

Lin Kven Lee plans to marry Custer Hong in a few months.

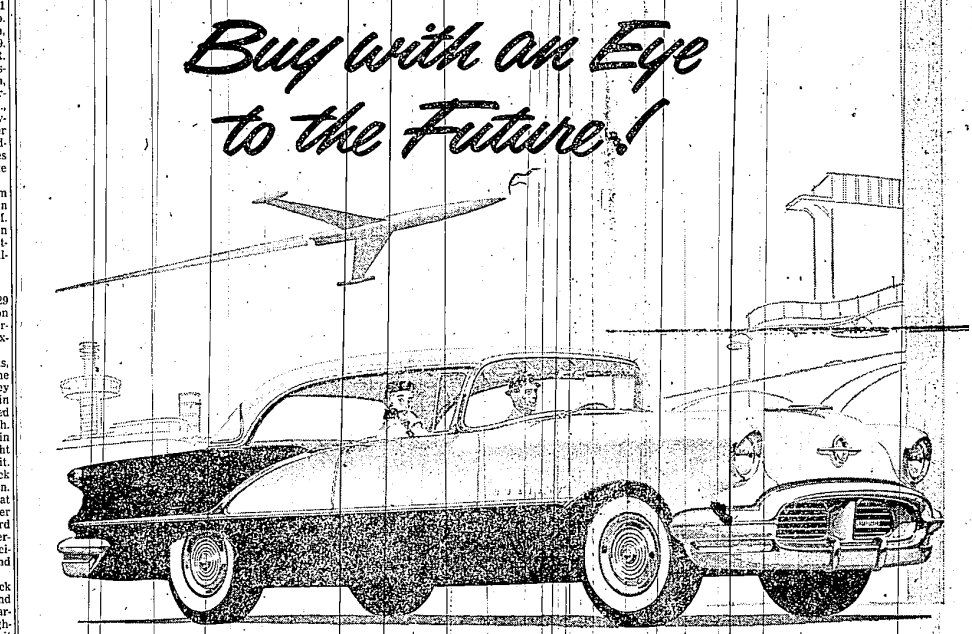
