Trojans Lose Out To Loop Leading Milford Five, 65-56

In action last Friday night, the Clarencville Trojans lost a 65-56 decision to the league-leading Milford Redskins, but not without putting up a good fight.

The strong Milford quintet took an early lead and held it throughout the contest, despite strong efforts by the Trojans to turn the tables. By the end of the third quarter the Milford club was ahead by a seven-point margin, 39-33.

In the final period the Trojans mounted a desperate drive. Fighting hard for possession of the ball at every opportunity, high-scoring Darryl Riddling of the Trojans forced out and Dale Devitt was taken out for unsportsmanlike conduct.

After the score had been raised to 52-45 in favor of Milford, a series of fast breaks were staged by the Milford five, led by Davidson. Before the Trojans could adjust their defense, Milford had dumped in three fast baskets to lead 59-45.

The Trojans came right back, however, and pumped in five fast points for themselves to slim Milford's margin again to eight points.

For the remainder of the game it was a nip and tuck battle with Milford adding seven points while staving off a Trojan rally, holding them to six points.

High point scorer for the Trojans was Devitt with 14 points, followed closely by Riddling and Gary Benson with 12 points each.

This Friday the Trojans will meet Clarkston in the final league contest of the season. The game will be played at Clarencville.

Falcons Stage Last-Minute Rally To Down Waterford Quintet 53-51

An inspired, fighting Falcon team bounced back from its 63-42 overtime loss to Walld Lake last night to conquer Waterford, 53-51, in a thrilling, last-minute rally Friday night.

After leading throughout the first three quarters, Farmington saw its lead erased in the fourth quarter. With four and one-half minutes left, the Falcons fell behind by two points. For the next three minutes the lead ebb-and-flowed back and forth from one team to the other.

However, with the score tied at 41 and a minute left, Dave Warriner sank a set shot from the corner to win it for Farmington.

In the first quarter the Falcons raced to a 14-8 edge, led by Don Nichols and Jerry Flick with four points each.

Waterford suddenly caught fire in the second quarter and, led by Kruskie's eight points, outscored the Falcons 17-14. The Falcons could not stop Kruskie who, for eight minutes, put on a dazzling one-man show in shooting and on rebounds.

However, Kruskie was not enough as at halftime the score was 29-25 in favor of Farmington. Nichols, McDonald, and Jones paced Farmington with four points each.

In the third quarter Farmington, led by McDonald with six points and Jones with five, outscored the Skippers 13-10 to once again gain a lead of six points, 48-35. Gillis and Kruskie, with four points, tried desperately to keep Waterford in the game.

In the final quarter Waterford fought back fiercely and with four and one-half minutes left, Gillis shot put the Skippers ahead 44-43.

Then Flick, for Farmington, and Bersche for Waterford, put on a sparkling display of clutch shooting.

Flick hit first from deep in the corner to give Farmington a brief lead. Then, from nearly half-court, Bersche heaved one in and once again Waterford led.

Flick promptly dropped in another and Farmington was on the long end of a 47-46 score.

Bersche, not to be denied, once again hit for two points and put the Skippers in front, 49-47.

Mehker was fouled with two and one-half minutes left and dropped in one point to give Waterford a 49-47 lead.

Flick then hit for his third basket and sixth point to knot the score with two minutes left.

Fifteen seconds later Bersche hit for what looked like the big one to give Waterford a 51-49 lead. However, Warriner dropped in a set shot to knot it up with one and one-half minutes remaining.

Bersche attempted a set shot and missed. With one minute remaining, Warriner won it with another set shot.

Nichols was fouled with thirty seconds left, but failed at the line and Waterford raced up-court. However, a desperate last-second shot by Kruskie fell short and so did the Skippers, as Farmington won the game 53-51.
