The Farmington School Board, at its last regular meeting, approved the request 'fin principle' by a majority decision. The final outcome will depend to a large digree upon opinions of state dfficials as well as legislation now being considered in Lansing. However, these opinions will only serve as a guide, since the decision must be made by the local Board.

This is not an easy decision, since a great many factors are involved. There are the legal as well as a the practical aspects of the problem. It is our opinion that the final laction of the Board must rest on these factors. We believe that everything possible should be done to accommodate parochial school children, consistent with the law and with practical administration. It is the opinion of the Attorney General that sparochial school youngsters may be transported on public schools buses along the regular established a route. It ils also his opinion that the public schools shall be reimbursed for such services by the state.

Aside from the legal phases, the question resolves itself down to a financial and administrative problem. If, according to the opinion of the Attorney General, such transportation is reimbursable, it is should not cause, any additional burden on the taxpayers. From an administration stranspoint, the sproblem is hot quite so easy, yet it is not insurmountable in our poinion. There is still considerable controversy regarding the transportation of public school children. These problems deserve consideration. However, since they involve questions which are exceptions to the state law, they would not be greatly complicated by the transportation of public school children. These problem must be dealt with on the basis of law and practical application.
