The Farmington varsity ended the regular basketball season's play on a high note Friday night by defeating Van Dyke 72-57. For six of Farmington's players, Don Nichols, Don Robinson, Jerry Flick, Louis Gildemeister, Bill Robinson and Sid Bishop, it was the last scheduled game for Farmington. All are seniors.

An inspired Van Dyke five, playing better than at any previous time this year, gave the Falcons a scare for the first three quarters before finally being subdued. The Falcons went into the game confident of a victory but the Aces weren't going down easily. The first quarter was a hard-fought contest with Farmington leading 12-6.

Don Robinson, playing his best game of the year, led a rally in the second quarter which saw the Falcons pull ahead by 10 points. Van Dyke, however, came back to ward the end of the period and made it 39-31 at halftime. Robinson and Jones with 18 and 13 points, respectively, led the Falcons into the first half.

During the third quarter Robinson was closely guarded, but McDonald, who sank eight, and Nichols, with five, took up the slack. Farmington took control of the game in the fourth quarter.

INCREASE SOUGHT IN GAME, FISHING LICENSE FEES

The Conservation Commission voted unanimously recently to ask the Michigan legislature for an increase in fishing, small game and deer license fees.

Department Director Gerald E. Eddy asked that the fishing license be increased from \$1.50 to \$2, that the small game license be hiked from \$2 to \$3, and that the deer license be moved from \$3.50 to \$4.50.
