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PONTIAC CONCERT TO FEATURE NOTED PIANIST MARCH 14

Vivian Scott, Pontiac concert pianist, will be featured guest artist with the Pontiac Symphony Orchestra at 8:30 p.m. March 14 at the concert in Lincoln Junior High School auditorium in Pontiac.

Miss Scott, a 1949 graduate of Julliard School of Music, has also studied in Europe, and made a successful New York debut last March in a Town Hall recital.

At the March 14 concert Miss Scott will present Beethoven's "Piano Concerto No. 5 (Emperor)." The orchestra, conducted by Francesco di Biagi, will open with Weber's "Der Freischutz" overture. Tchaikovsky's "Swan Lake Ballet," "Gymnopies" by Satie, Debussy, and the Good Friday music from "Parafal" will complete the program.

This is the fourth in a series of five concerts presented this season by the Pontiac Symphony Orchestra.

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Sgt. F. Winters Now In Florida

After completing his Air Force basic training at Manhattan Beach, Brooklyn, he was based at Itami Air Base in Japan prior to assignment in Florida.

The "Black Knights" of the Seventeenth won two Presidential Citations during World War II in missions ranging from the famous "Doolittle Raid" against Tokyo in April, 1942, to ten major campaigns in North Africa and Europe. At the close of hostilities in 1945, the 17th had compiled 602 combat missions after 28 months of continuous action.

Sgt. Winters is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond E. Winters, 3406 Elmwood Street. He is married to the former Betty Jean Kenney of Farmington. Sgt. and Mrs. Winters have three children, ages 1, 3 and 4. He attended Anacortes Senior High School in Washington, D. C. before entering the service in 1945.

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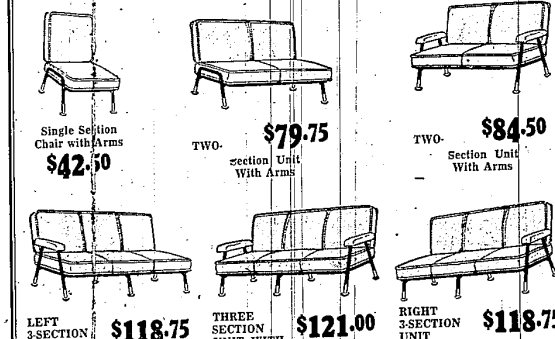
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
