Falcons Lose To St. Mary's, 69-51, In Opening Round Of Tourney Play

The Farmington Falcons concluded basketball play for their season last Friday night when they were beaten out in the opening round of the district basketball tournament at their home floor by a strong Redford St. Mary's team, 69-51.

The stellar play of St. Mary's rangy star, Ron Donahoe, proved too much for the Falcons to cope with. Donahoe paced the St. Mary's team throughout the contest and racked up a total of 26 points for high scoring honors.

In the first quarter, play was a nip-and-tuck with the Falcons coming out on the top end of a 12-11 score. In the second quarter the Falcons displayed an improved brand of ball and pushed ahead by a 28-23 margin at halftime. The Falcon offensive attack in the second period was led by Don Robinson, who dumped in seven of his team's 16 points.

Coming out for the second half, the St. Mary's team swung into action to prove that they really are a championship team, as pre-game ratings had indicated. Turning on a brilliant offensive attack, they racked up 23 points while holding the Falcons to a lowly 10. Carthar and Donahoe paced the St. Mary's attack in the quarter with 9 and 8 points respectively.

The Rusties continued to set a torrid pace in the final period and racked up another 23 points while the Falcons struggled to add 13 to their score. After Bud Jones, Don McDonald and Don Robinson fouled out in the final period, the Falcon offense and defense fell apart at the seams.

An excellent showing at the free throw line proved a big help to St. Mary's. They compiled a splendid percentage by dumping in 27 of the 30 foul shots they attempted. Donahoe alone swished in 12 of his total 25 points in the free throw line. Farmington, on the other hand, showed poorly on their gift tosses.

Leading scorer for Farmington was Jones with 22 points, followed by Don Nichols with 14 and Don Robinson with 10. Top scorers for the Rusties were: Donahoe, 26; Carthar, 14; and Oles, 10.
