Makes First Solo Jet Plan Flight

Aviation Cadet John R. Shutts, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Shutts of 25383 Brookdale, Farmington, recently made his first solo jet flight in the pilot training program at Laughlin Air Force Base in Del Rio, Texas.

Cadet Shutts was assigned to Laughlin upon graduation from the primary phase of training, where he completed the initial flying course. He has flown 20 training hours in the light plane trainer, the PA-18, and 100 hours in the larger single engine trainer, the T-6. At Laughlin, he will make the transition into jet aircraft and log 110 more flying hours in the T-33 jet before graduation. Besides the flying training, he will complete an exciting academic program and a strenuous physical education program designed to condition him for the rigors of the longer hours of high speed, high altitude flying.
