stated that no resolution to that effect has been passed by the Board, although he was personally opposed to issuing any building permits unless satisfactory water is available on the site.

Mrs. Philip Newberg, secretary of the Water Development Committee, reported on the progress of petitioning in the proposed Township Water District. She added that the association deserves some credit since they worked for over 15 months in an effort to solve the water problem.
