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Future Of SC Continuum Uncertain Despite Protest

The fate of the women's continuum at Schoolcraft College is still an uncertainty despite the efforts of approximately 25 women who jammed Wednesday's board of trustees study session on the \$74 budget.

Rumors that the program would be eliminated because of lack of funds prompted the demonstration by the non-carrying women, who presented fact sheets and arguments to board members.

The continuum, along with the Garden City service center and senior adults program at Schoolcraft, was funded through a special \$100,000 state grant which is only a possibility for the coming year's budget.

Nancy Duford, director of the continuum, and senior adults program director Betty Andrews have received notices that their employment will terminate this month unless additional funds are made available.

Spokeswoman Jeanette Shanks read a statement asking the board to make the continuum a permanent office at SCC.

"We feel that the women of this district should not be dependent on special funding from Lansing," the statement said. "Letting this office continue on our own funds would not be setting any dangerous precedent."

"The board already supports athletic programs

which are primarily for men. There are also two full time male counselors assigned to the technical building whose primary function is to serve men. Since women constitute 40 per cent of the enrollment, we feel that we deserve some type of representation on this campus."

Citing several examples of alleged discrimination in employment at Schoolcraft, the statement accused the administration of offering the six-month life of the continuum as a "token."

Schoolcraft president C. Nelson Grote told the women's group that his "best information" from the state legislature "within the last few hours" indicated that the full \$100,000 grant would be included in the committee recommendation to the House of Representatives, and would probably be supported.

If the grant is renewed, he implied, the program could be continued.

At a later board study session, Dr. Grote reported that funds have been allocated for employment of one full time professional staff member in the area of senior adults and continuum regardless of the outcome of the special grant. Community service programs, he emphasized, will remain an "institutional priority."

"We can have a women's continuum without a

full-time director and without an identified office," Grote said.

Trustee Rosina Raymond, one of two female board members, disagreed. "We should have something in the budget earmarked women's continuum," she said. "There is a real concern for this. It should not be stuck under something else."

The ultimate fate of the program, along with several other budget areas, remains dependent on the final action of the House, which Grote said could come by this weekend.

The board will present a budget for 1973-74, balanced without the anticipated \$100,000, at a public hearing scheduled for Wednesday, June 27, at 7 p.m.



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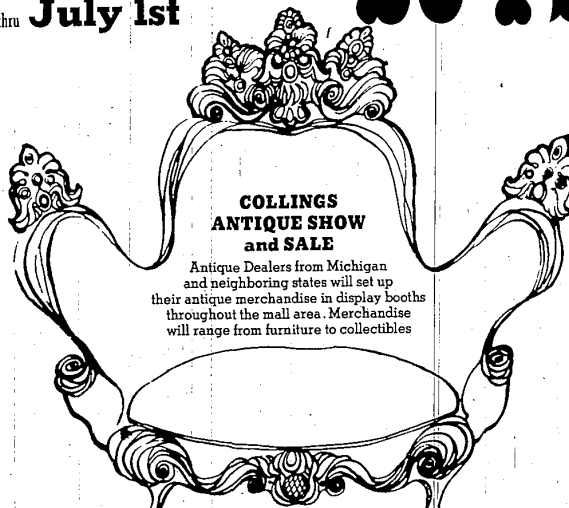


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
