

# NORMAN KROLL NAMED LINCOLN CONTROL MANAGER

Appointment of Norman F. Kroll of 1459 Flamingo, Livonia, as quality control manager of the Lincoln Division of Ford Motor Company was announced recently by W. D. Singleton, division general manufacturing manager.

Born in Detroit July 29, 1912, Kroll was graduated from Northwestern High School in 1930. He entered the Henry Ford Apprentice School and received his diploma in 1934.

After his graduation, he began working in various manufacturing operations at the Rouge plant. In 1942 he moved to Ford's Highland Park plant and was made general superintendent for tractor operations in 1944.

From 1949 to 1954, Kroll served as general superintendent of the gear and shaft plant and later as manager of the rocket and parts machining plant at Highland Park.

He was named manager of manufacturing services at the Highland Park plant in 1954.

In December 1955, Kroll joined the Lincoln Division as a technical assistant for Lincoln's production operations.

The Farmington Senior High School Mixed Choir received a 1 rating at the District IV Choral and Glee Club Festival held at Royal Oak High School on March 13.

Each school was required to give one chorale and one selection of their own choice. Farmington's mixed chorus presented a chorale from the St. Matthew Passion, "The Sorrows Thou Art Bearing," by Bach. As their second selection they sang "Wherever Shall I Come Before the Lord," by Gladys Blakely Bush.

Farmington was judged by Mr. Klepinger, Loren Coby and Doris A. Paul. Two of the judges rated F. H. S. superior and one rated them as excellent. After each selection the choruses were rated verbally by the judges and also on an adjudication comment sheet.

The three judges commented on several outstanding points of the mixed chorus: They were: 1. outstanding intonation and tone quality of the group; 2. outstanding quality and maturity in the boys' voices; and 3. excellent deportment on the part of the group in both listening and participating.

Mr. William Feicht, vocal director, commented on the outstandingly "superior job" done by the soloists and Philomnairs at the festival on the preceding Saturday and the mixed chorus at the choral festival. He hopes that the superior ratings will encourage building even bigger and stronger vocal groups in the years to come.
