Democratic Club To Meet In Clarenceville April 4

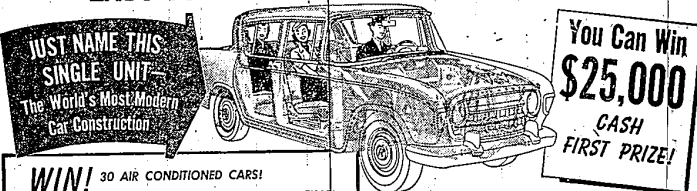
