

ARCHERY DEER HUNTING GAINS IN POPULARITY

Archery deer hunting, growing more popular each year, attracted a record turnout of more than 37,000 sportsmen in Michigan last year, an increase of some 4300 over 1954.

Hunting license sales reports through February of this year show that 33,630 residents and 3509 nonresidents purchased archery deer permits for the 1955 season.

Archery hunting licenses for 1954 included 29,941 residents and 2883 nonresidents.

Other hunting license sales also showed increases over 1954. Resident small game hunting licenses were reported through February totaled 701,859, a 2.4 per cent increase over the same period last year. Nonresident small game licenses sales jumped from 7231 to 7748, a 7.2 per cent increase.

SOME WATERS OPEN TO BOW AND ARROW, SPEAR FISHING

Lists of Michigan waters open to spear fishing during two separate seasons now are available from the Conservation Department's fish division in Lansing.

During the spring season, spears and bows and arrows may be used for taking carp, suckers, bass, muskellunge, dogfish and garpike in designated waters from April 1 through May 31 in the lower peninsula and during the month of May in the U. P.

Artificial lights are allowed for spearing on some of the designated streams during the spring season.

The summer spearing season, May 1 to August 15, is open for the taking of carp, dogfish and garpike in designated waters in the upper and lower peninsulas. Artificial lights may be used on all lakes and streams included on the summer season list.

PREDICT 10,000 WILL TAKE HIKES IN AREA PARKS

Ten thousand youngsters and adults will take nature field trips in Huron - Clinton Metropolitan Authority parks during spring, summer and fall of 1956. That is the estimate of Bill Hopkins, chief naturalist for the Authority.

With spring officially here, trips to be conducted by Hopkins or his assistants, Charles Damm, already are scheduled as far ahead as May. Their services for organized groups are available free by calling or writing the Authority, 17500 Woodward Building, Detroit 26, Michigan.

Conducted trips may be made in Kensington Metropolitan Park, Lower Huron Metropolitan Park, DeWitt - Huron Metropolitan Park or at Metropolitan Beach.

In addition to field tours, the naturalists are available for illustrated lectures on nature and conservation subjects. The color film of animal and bird life in the parks also is shown. Sixty-three talks were given for 9,303 persons in 1955.

"Self-guiding" trails in Kensington and Lower Huron parks enable visitors to study natural features alone. Trees, shrubs, flowers and geographical features are labeled and some of the signs dramatize botanical, geographical and historical facts.

Commission Authorizes Purchase Of Game Lands

Seven tracts of land, totaling 368 acres, were added to public hunting areas by the Conservation Commission at March 15-16 meeting in Lansing.

The Commission agreed to purchase lands for the following additions:

120 acres at Rouge River state game area, 80 acres at Detroit state game area, 41 acres at Middleville state game area, 40 acres at Gratiot-Sterling state game area, 40 acres at Napanook Pointe wildlife area, 37 acres at Danville state game area, and 10 acres at Gregory state game area.

Heavy Starvation Loss Expected In Deer Herd

Comparison of field reports with past years indicates Michigan deer starvation losses this winter may be the worst since the 1950-51 winter when an estimated 40,000 to 50,000 deer died.

New snowdrifts in mid-March aggravated the plight of already weakened deer and starvation were reported in all districts of the upper and northern lower peninsulas.

One of these reads: "Tamarack Bog - This bog is a relic of the Ice Age. It was formed about 10,000 years ago when the retreating glacier left a mass of ice which later melted, leaving a water-filled depression. Decayed vegetation called peat replaced the water. The soil is still water-soaked but supports woody plants."

Other signs tell how granite was formed, such as the light in the earth, how streams will eventually reach the Atlantic; some deal with trail courses and still others point to fox dens, muskrat houses and squirrel nests.
