Final Plans For Family Symphony
Concert Announced At Coffee Hour

Wayne Dunlap, conductor of the Plymouth Symphony, announced at a coffee hour Sunday afternoon the program for the Family Symphony Concert, to be presented on April 22 in Farmington.

Approximately 60 area residents heard Dunlap discuss the final plans for the concert, which will be presented in the Farmington High School auditorium on Shawnee Road.

The program, chosen to appeal to both children and adults, will include the following selections: "The Ballet Suite" by Greta, "The Sea" by Debussy, and a group of Strauss compositions including: "Pizzicato Polka," "Perpetual Motion," "Tales from Vienna Woods," "The Pleasure Train," and "Radetzky March."

Dunlap spent some time in Vienna last year and tried to bring back to his group techniques that would enable them to present the Strauss music in the true Viennese fashion. To aid authenticity to the Strauss selections, Dunlap hopes to present two zither players as guest soloists at the April 22 concert. They will appear in native Bavarian costumes, he stated.

The American Association of University Women is sponsoring the concert. It is being presented solely for the community's entertainment. A. A. U. W. officials pointed out, and not for financial gain. A nominal charge will be made to cover the cost involved.

Two types of tickets will be sold: individual and family tickets. The family ticket will admit one or both parents and their children, and is double the price of an individual ticket. Tickets may be secured by calling Mrs. Donald McCracken at GR. 4-2526.

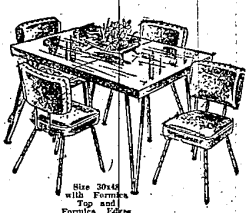

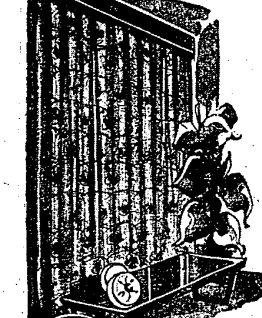
