# Flower Show Opens April 8

Flower and garden enthusiasts of the Detroit metropolitan area and outstate Michigan and northern Ohio will offer thousands of colorful exhibits at the second annual spring flower show at the Ford Rotunda in Dearborn, beginning Sunday, April 8.

The show, free to the public, will run through April 22. Called "Flowers International," it will feature the gay colors of flowers and spring fashions. The Detroit Garden Center and the J. L. Hudson Company are cooperating with Ford Motor Company in the presentation.

The international theme will be highlighted in Dutch, French, English and tropical gardens. The flowers will be displayed in special exhibits typical of those areas. Spring fashions appropriate to each garden also will be shown.

Another feature of the show will be table settings in rooms furnished in Dutch, French, English and tropical style. The table settings, like all other floral displays, will be judged and changed every third day throughout the show.

A series of lectures and films of interest to gardeners will be presented in the Rotunda auditorium. Last year's first spring flower and fashion show, "Dream Garden," attracted 107,000 visitors to the Rotunda.

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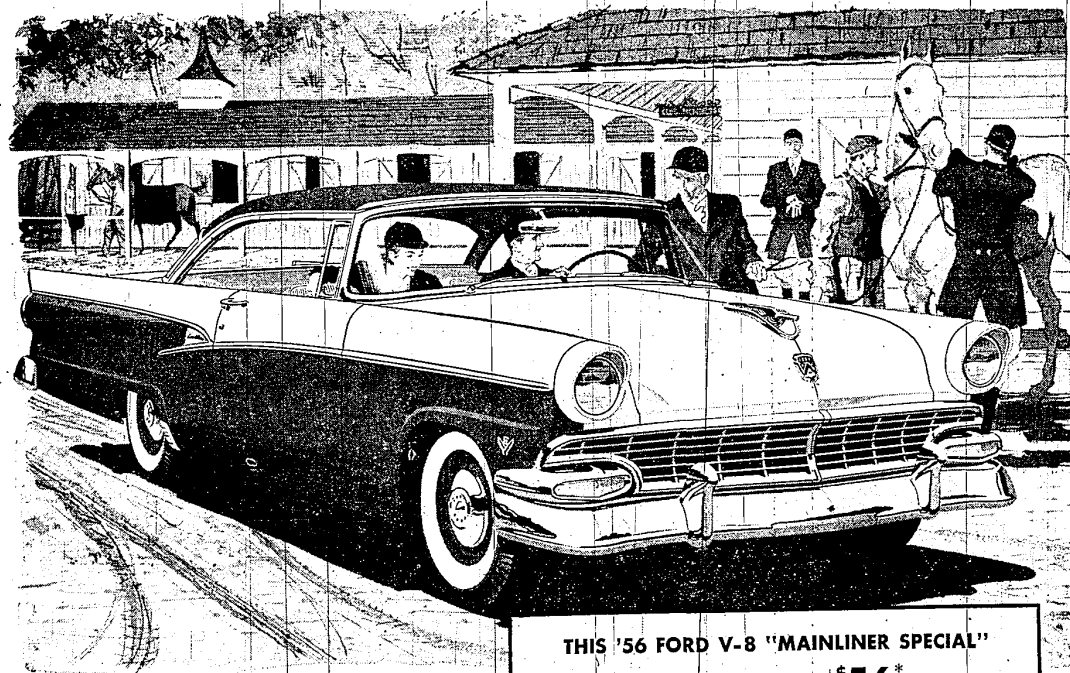
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
