

## Paint Brush Care Important

If you are painting, varnishing, or doing other wood finishing jobs, you need to take care of the paint brushes.

A new brush almost always has a few loose hairs that should be removed before you use it, cautions Frieda A. Bennett, home demonstration agent for Oakland County. She advises rubbing the bristles back and forth across the hand to remove both dust and loose hairs. Then wash the brush in a cleaning fluid of your start the job not only with a new brush, but with an entirely clean wipe of.

After using the brush, wipe off all excess paint, or varnish thoroughly with a cloth and then brush back and forth on a clean piece of paper. All varnish or paint must be removed or it will harden in the bristles. The brush will never be free of little bits of this dirt material, that will get into new work.

"Mrs. Bennett suggests cleaning the brush in from three to five jars of cleaning fluid, used one after another until the fluid is absolutely clean. The cleaning fluid should be kept in glass jars with covers that do not have rubber inside because the rubber softens and may drop into the fluid. When the brush is clean and dry, wrap it in metal foil and storing on a flat surface to keep bristles flat and in shape.

## Law Requires Testing Of Seed

To assure the people in Michigan who will be buying seed this spring that their purchases are of proper germination and free of noxious weeds, the seed testing laboratory of the Michigan Department of Agriculture in Lansing has been working at capacity.

Purchasers of seeds can only take full advantage of this important work by taking pains to read the tag on the package or the declaration of purity and germination on the packet they buy. Under Michigan law this information must be on seed packages.

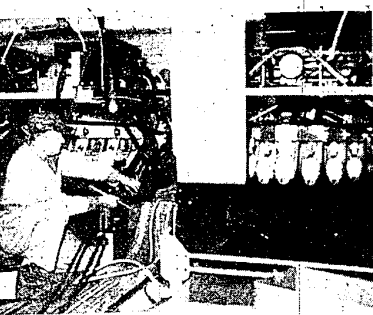
In the Department's seed testing laboratory at Lansing, seeds are sprouted in germinators under strict temperature and humidity controls that as nearly as possible simulate actual growing conditions in the field.

Seed is first examined by skilled seed analysts with the aid of glasses like a jeweler's glass, which greatly magnify the sample. The technicians are able to identify all crop seeds as well as the seeds of noxious weeds common to Michigan.

They can pick every clover seed out of any analytical sample of alfalfa seed and tell the rate of occurrence per pound.

Almost instantly they can identify all seeds listed as noxious weed seed in Michigan and determine the occurrence in terms of pounds of seed. They also know if a seed may be sold in Michigan, and that its content of noxious weed seed must be declared on the tag.

Every lot of seed has its lot number or other mark in Michigan, and the laboratory can keep records and complete details of the analysis.

## SPIESER TO MEET BIG BOXING TEST IN DETROIT APRIL 11

Chuck Spieser, one of the finest fighting men that ever came out of Detroit, will return to his home town Wednesday, April 11, to take on Joe Rowan, the tough and ready Philadelphia heavyweight, in a crucial ten-round test at the Olympia Stadium.

This is the bout that could make or break Spieser, who is now ranked No. 4 among the challengers for Archie Moore's light heavyweight crown.

Spieser is riding high. Since he finished his stint with the Air Force in 1945, he has scored six knockouts, fought one draw and lost one. "The draw and the loss stemmed from a dual with Willie Pastrano. Although Pastrano out-weighted him by a dozen pounds, most TV viewers thought Spieser had clearly won the second bout, which was called a draw.

Included in Spieser's string of wins are impressive knockouts over Willie Troy (in five rounds) and Paddy Yang (in two). Spieser's surge to the top, he has also stopped Andy Mayfield, Frank DeGrazio, Elmo Smith and Wilbur Dilly.

Rowan is regarded by many boxers as the toughest foe Spieser has ever met. Like Pastrano, Rowan is a legitimate heavyweight. He lacks Pastrano's boxing skill, but he is a more damaging puncher.

Rowan's record is impressive. In a career that started in 1932, he has won 27 bouts, fought one draw and lost seven. Included in his victories are 14 knockouts. He proved his heart and his punching power in a nationally televised bout with giant Holman last month. Rowan kept moving in against his much bigger foe all the way and he gave Holman all he could handle.

## REVEAL 25 KILLED 200 HUNT IN STATE HUNTING ACCIDENTS

Hunting accidents took the lives of 25 persons and wounded 200 others during Michigan's 1949 small game and deer hunting seasons, the State Conservation Department revealed.

By comparison, the 1954 figures were 19 killed and 230 wounded.

During the small game seasons, with 728,000 hunters offed, 15 persons were killed and 135 wounded by firearms. Ten persons were killed and 42 wounded during the firearm and archery deer seasons which attracted 425,000 hunters.

Accident averages during the small game season showed one fatality per 48,500 hunters and one wounding per 4,800 hunters. The deer season averages showed one fatality per 42,300 hunters and one wounding for every 10,000 hunters.

Careless gun-handling in hunting parties was one of the chief causes of accidents. Of the 15 small game hunting deaths, 13 victims were within 10 yards of the fatal weapon and five of the accidental deaths were self-inflicted.

In eight of the 15 small game fatalities, the persons responsible was 17 years of age or younger. On the other hand, persons over 21 caused eight of the 10 deaths during deer hunting seasons.

Total hunting fatalities in recent years include, 27 in 1953, 25 in 1952, 23 in 1951 and 25 in 1950.

## One Million More Doses Of Salk Vaccine Promised State This Spring

Michigan should get about one million more doses of polio vaccine over the next three months, it was announced last week by the state health department in a summary of vaccine distribution.

Dr. Albert E. Heustis, State Health Commissioner, said that while the department lacks reliable information for an exact forecast on vaccine which may be allotted to Michigan, the amount should range between 804,681 doses to 1,292,400 doses during the next three months.

The vaccine is released to states on a population basis by the U. S. Public Health Service. Michigan gets slightly more than four percent (4,308) of the vaccine allotted.

"A firm prediction on the amount of vaccine which may be released to us cannot be made, since under safety testing requirements, any lot of vaccine which does not pass the final test cannot be released, but has to be discarded," Dr. Heustis said.

He reported that so far Michigan has received 1,726,413 doses of vaccine. This includes 1,071,849 doses purchased by the Michigan Department of Health, plus 654,564 doses made available earlier by the National Polio Foundation.

The vaccine received, he said, represents slightly over 28 percent of the amount needed to give protection against paralytic polio to the priority groups - youngsters one through fourteen years of age and pregnant women.

"While we're in complete sympathy with the complaints from many parents who have not yet been able to get vaccine for their youngsters," Dr. Heustis said, "reports from the four states nearest Michigan - Indiana, Ohio, Illinois and Wisconsin - indicate that their situation is about the same. At no time have they had enough vaccine to satisfy the demand."

In an attempt to make available vaccine cover more youngsters, Dr. Heustis said the health department is urging doctors to use vaccine being released currently for first and second doses only.

He said that parents wondering about the timing of the second and third doses of vaccine should be advised that the first shot does not lose its effect so long as the second dose is given sometime in the following 12 month period.

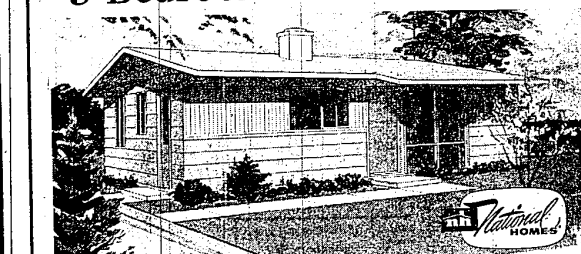
