## Rotunda Flower Show Now Open

Gardens of Holland, England, France and Hawaii are now being exhibited in "Flowers International," the second annual flower and fashion show which opened Sunday, April 8, at the Ford Rotunda in Dearborn.

Thousands of colorful flowers and numerous varieties of foliage are on display at the show which is free to the public. The Detroit Garden Center and J. L. Hudson Company are cooperating with Ford Motor Company in presenting the show which will continue through April 22.

A replica of the Eiffel Tower, 60 feet high and decorated by flowers and 3,000 miniature lights, has been erected in front of the Rotunda to establish the international theme of the show.

Inside the Rotunda, elaborate exhibits provide the setting for the floral displays. Show panels and table settings appropriate to each area are featured.

Nearly 200 exhibitors are participating in the two-week show. Communities represented are Detroit, Dearborn, Grosse Ile, Highland Park, Grosse Pointe, Ferndale, Royal Oak, Farmington, Birmingham, Wayne, Ann Arbor, Pleasant Ridge, Milford, Belleville, Rochester, Beverly Hills, Huntington Woods, Monroe, New Boston, Taylor Center, Franklin Village, Southfield Township, Inster, Bloomfield Hills, and Wyandotte in Michigan, and Celina, Ohio.

The exhibitors, both clubs and individuals, are among the 12,000 Michigan garden enthusiasts affiliated with the Detroit Garden Center.

Motion pictures and lectures pertaining to gardening, flower arranging and related subjects are being presented daily in the Rotunda auditorium.

The Rotunda is maintaining its customary schedule during the show.

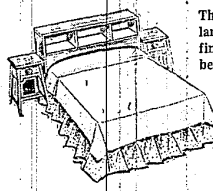
